



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Dear Friends,

The Cathedral gardens are looking wonderful with Snowdrops, Hellebores of various hues, Winter Aconites with their bright yellow petals and their very dark green leaves. It all gives a sign of hope that Spring is really not far off. As I write this next Sunday will be the Second Sunday before Lent: designated 'Creation Sunday' when we think about the beauty and the suffering of the created world. The Lections are a great help to us: the Creation narrative of Genesis 1, the 'groaning' of creation as seen by Saint Paul and Jesus's command to leave aside anxiety and look at the beauty around us.

But life and beauty bring with it the possibility of suffering.

For all life, the cellular events of division and energy production that keep us in health are fragile so with trillions of cells in the body it is small wonder that sometimes things go wrong and we become ill and with this comes suffering. Not only is there physical suffering but we also suffer because we are greedy and possessive, anxious for our own welfare for the future, which in turn spoils the potential we have for building beautiful relationships

Jesus intimates that anxiety clouds our vision so that we no longer recognize the beauty of the lilies of the field or the choreography of birds in flight: nor do we see the necessity for preserving the ecosystems for their own sake. We consider that because we have been given domination over the created order, we can exploit the natural world as we like. So over the years our environment has become polluted by our activities which diminish its beauty. All over the world, the demands of rich nations are causing habitat loss in rainforest, savannah and wetlands, such that the endemic plants, birds and animals are forced into increasingly smaller and smaller areas, dwindling in numbers and falling to extinction So should we despair?

No! For Jesus was perceived as both divine and human so that we see in him the New Creation who was the one who through his ministry, suffering and death could make sense of the new perspectives given to him and share with us the life in God to whom he returned: a new dimension of creation. His was the glory promised by Paul when he writes about the 'creation groaning in travail until now'. For Paul, the whole universe needs redemption under the loving control of 'The-One-That-Is', the supreme God who loved the world so much, and saw that the creation was good. He never leaves us without hope. If God creates the world to include human beings, he will also endure the suffering that results in order to give us the chance of glory. God took the suffering into the Divine life where it was transfigured and changed into glory. From the time we desire to follow Christ, we are bidden to set our minds on the glory which comes by way of the cross. We stand with the suffering, crucified Lord and by this action the redemption of the pain and grief begins.

In the world creatures are free to make their own lives and they in turn affect the lives of their descendants and the lives of the community. Everything is bound together – we are part of the whole and we suffer with each other as we also find happiness in one another. Greed and desire makes us anxious to maintain position; it makes us cling to material things so that they have the priority, as Jesus suggests in the Sermon on the Mount. Worry is blind, refusing to learn the lesson of trust in God's providence: a lesson taught us by the creatures in the natural world.

The message of Creation Sunday, coming as it does just before we enter Lent, is clear – we must appreciate the created order, nurture it, protect it and accept our place within it. On Ash Wednesday we are reminded 'Dust you are and unto dust you shall return. Repent and believe the Gospel.' We are made of stardust: ephemeral and frail but we see the work of creation as the on-going activity of God: creating, sustaining and nurturing the whole universe. We also see it as a source of hope for the whole creation, for we look into the groaning of creation and into the suffering towards the glory.

As we move forward into Lent we have the opportunity to consider our place within the world and within the whole of creation.

So, I pray that you will all have a creative Lent of prayer, study and joy in the work of God's hands.

Wednesday 11th January saw fourteen members and guests converge at the Church of Saint Peter and Saint Paul, River, Dover, for a service of Holy Communion taken by the Vicar, Father Andrew Bawtree.

As all members of the Committee were present a meeting was held afterwards, before we all went for lunch at the Kitty-Wake Pub and I had a really lovely and surprising discovery walking round the church.

In a corner I spied a nice looking Font with a beautifully inscribed brass plate on the West wall above it.

To my great joy I found that it was the Font from Saint Mary Magdalene Church, Burgate in Canterbury, which was purchased in 1875 by the Reverend Charles Morice

from Saint Mary Magdalene's as it was being 'Tidied Up.' The Font is of great importance to me as it is believed to have been dedicated by Archbishop Aelphage in 1010. Two years later he was captured by the Danes and martyred at Greenwich. This was a lovely find for me as I was walking round.

The church has some fine Victorian glass and the Lectern is from Saint James the Apostle Church in Dover which was badly damaged by heavy bombing and long distance fire by the Germans during the war. It was presented to River Church for safekeeping. There is a splendid Royal Coat of Arms in the church and I loved the carved Oak Reredos and Pulpit.

I have to thank Chris Crooks for the two photos of the interior of the church looking towards the High Altar and the Branch members outside the Kitty-Wake Pub after our lunch. My own camera malfunctioned due to battery failure and Chris kindly produced the pictures.

I would also like to thank Suzanne Mills, Father Bawtree, our Secretary, Janet, and our Chairman, Julian, for all they did for getting this lovely day going so smoothly.

I am sorry I missed the last date but here is a record of the meeting our Branch had when about a dozen of us met at Saint Nicholas Church, Arundel, which was built in 1380 on the site of an earlier church, built in 1102 as a Priory.

The Priory was dissolved in 1380 when a College of the Holy Trinity, with an adjoining Hospice was established on the site by Richard FitzAlan, the eleventh Earl of Arundel, to serve the needs of Twenty Poor Men and to give them Ordination.

Beyond the East End of the church, adjoining it is the FitzAlan Chapel also built by Richard, but this was desecrated by the Roundheads in 1643. It was restored in 1886 by the fifteenth Duke. There is a Roman Catholic Chapel for the Dukes of Norfolk and their family.

The Dukes of Norfolk are Fitz Alan-Howard and he is the Earl Marshall, head of the College of Arms and responsible for the organisation of all State ceremonies and processions.

After being given various pieces of information about the church by a parishioner, and a Communion Service, a fish and chip lunch was collected and followed by ice cream. Two of our members had a Civic Funeral, so were unable to join us, (what a pity there were so few present.)

We had four meetings in 2016, but two of these were within a week of each other, the first to say a fond farewell to our long standing Chaplain of thirty-three years, the Reverend Canon Christopher Valins, on Wednesday 25th May and the installation of our new Chaplain, the Reverend Roy Woodhams, by our National Chaplain Canon Maureen Palmer, on Tuesday 31st May.

If we had not had these two occasions, there would have only been two meetings during the year


There is a possibility that there may be new members in our Branch soon, so things are looking up.



THE DIPLOMA COURSE



The Central Council of the Guild, at the recommendation of General Synod, formulated a course to cover the work and ministry of the Verger. The course is formulated in four units set in two stages:

The first stage is the **Foundation** Unit, which comprises of sixteen assignments, covering preparation for worship, care of the building, record-keeping, and archives, care of the churchyard, and caring for the people of God.

The second stage comprises of the other three units:

The Verger as **Pastor** covers the individual's personal development, their relationship with the people and God, care for others, and for Church resources.

The Verger as **Historian** covers the history of church building, architecture, and the history of worship, including the Book of Common Prayer, and the Bible.

The Verger as **Administrator** covers communication, forms and registers, and the structures of the Church.

Students who complete the course successfully receive a diploma, an academic hood, and the right to use the post-nominal letters '**Dip.GV**'.
