FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL CHAPLAIN

Dear Friends,

Greetings for the season of Advent! I am sure that you are all looking at the diary and wondering how you will eat or sleep over the next few weeks!

I am sure that some of you will know the children' carol which begins:

How far is it to Bethlehem? Not very far. Shall we find the stable-room Lit by a star? Can we see the little Child, Is he within? If we lift the wooden latch May we go in?

The carol ends:

God in his mother's arms. Babes in the byre, Sleep, as they sleep who find Their heart's desire.

This is such a simple message but one we do well to ponder. During the days of Advent we are on a journey to Bethlehem - it's not very far but the going is hard and uphill and we will take a month of hard grind to get there. For Mary, the journey must have seemed interminable for she was uncomfortable, perhaps hungry and thirsty, and she must have been very frightened that the baby would appear before they reached Bethlehem, or that they would find nowhere to stay when they arrived.


For us, we must negotiate our way through endless Carol Services, tinsel on the floor, crumbs from mince pies that we must clean up and the smell of mulled wine, which will pervade our churches. We might well ask, 'What has this to do with the birth of a child?' Yet, we will reach Bethlehem, and we will enter the stable-room on Christmas morning when we receive our Lord in the joy of his birth: our heart's desire in bread and wine. We shall perhaps, as we relax on Christmas night, be able to appreciate that we have found our heart's desire in that Child.

I especially like this depiction of the Nativity from Africa, with the makeshift tent over the Virgin and Child and the shepherds standing within the light. As Herod said to the magi, so God now says to us: 'Search diligently for the Child' and when you have found him, your heart's desire, worship him in wonder and awe.

I wish you all the joy of the Christ Child and the peace that he will bring.

s you should have all by now received either an email or a letter advising you of the changes to the Guild that were voted on at the AGM in August. Here is just a short reminder:



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


CEGV AMBASSADORS TO VGEC

This was held at Camp Allen, a 7-mile plot of woodland and lakes owned by the Episcopal Church and 65-miles from Houston in Navasota County. It was beautifully appointed with quality en-suite rooms, superb food and a big chapel. This was a trial departure from the usual big city conference and the first time we didn't have to lug our heavy robes 5,000 miles. This enabled us to travel light with carry-on cases.

The keynote speaker was Rt. Revd Andrew Doyle, Bishop of Texas. Over three day of sessions we had speakers of the highest calibre covering the topics: 'Confessions of an Episcopal Evangelist' by Mollie Carnes and 'Digital Literacy for Ministry' by Revd Stacy Williams-Duncan.

We three Brits had a wonderfully warm welcome and had a great time of comradeship with our American peers. Next year the VGEC conference will be in Seattle. If we go, alas, robes will be needed for the big cathedral procession.

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MEET OUR FELLOWS

eing a Fellow of the Guild of Vergers is a role I am extremely proud of. Out of 12 Fellows world-wide there are only 2 women. I was the first, and our National Chaplain, Canon Maureen Palmer, the second.

I have enjoyed my role as Verger for many years. The church has been my Spiritual home for all my life and it was my desire to care for the church buildings (wherever I happened to be worshipping) and the churchyards.



An interest in the architecture, history and the ways a church was prepared for worship led me towards becoming a Verger. But the role is much more. Very often the first person a stranger will meet is a Verger, so the role is then very much a pastoral one, caring for the visitor as well as the regular congregation. It has always been important to me to make sure the altar and vessels associated with a service, especially the Eucharist, are in the appropriate place and ready for the priest to begin a service. The seating, the heating and the lighting are also of importance. Carrying the Verge to escort the person leading the service, clearing a pathway "weakest to the wall". Vergers also verge any special visitors patrons, royalty, and other dignitaries.

I willingly took the Diploma course which is a correspondence course with the oversight of my vicar and studied the structure of the Church of England its history and traditions, its administration and pastoral care.

It has been my privilege to serve the church as a verger for over 40 years and a red-letter day when we celebrated the Northern Provincial Rally in my home parish of Kirkleatham North Yorkshire in 2004. At the service I was overwhelmed to be made the first female Fellow.

I have always been happiest in church and deem myself privileged to sweep the floors, dust, move furniture, change light bulbs, sweep the paths, clean the silver, make sure the services are recorded, ensure we have clean linen and enough wine and wafers for the service all jobs that fill me with pride. I have done all these things for the glory of God and for the love of God


LEICESTER BRANCH

ello. My name is Edwin Taylor (Eddie) at present an assistant verger at the parish church, the Priory church of Lady St. Mary in Wareham, Dorset. I started my working life as a toolmaker in the engineering trade. I worked on press tools for the aero/motor industry, also moulds for the cosmetic trade, spending some 50 years in the trade. During this time I fulfilled roles as churchwarden at one of our 5 churches in the parish, and also as a sub-deacon visiting and assisting the priest at that time.

When our son reached his early 20's he joined Youth with a Mission/Mercy Ships (YWAM). Our first venture with

my wife and daughter was to join him in Bogota, Colombia to help refurbish a retreat house on a street kid's farm. From there I went alone to work on repairs in Victoria, Canada, and Cadiz, in Spain. I spent time in Newcastle dockyard during the time a rail ferry was being converted into a hospital ship. Back to YWAM, I helped with drilling water wells in Guatemala, and helped build houses in the poor area of Ensenada, Mexico. The houses are good for 20 years, termites permitting. Finally to San Pedro, in the Dominican Republic, again to build houses, all of this using holiday time from work until retirement.

Soon after I was invited to take up the position of assistant verger. I feel the work overseas has been my ministry and to be a verger is to continue that journey.

Foot note. This summer past our rector and his wife visited our son and his wife and children as part of his sabbatical in San Pedro. They work with the local churches holding various courses, including marriage preparation, and work in the local schools spreading the gospel.

A VISIT TO SALISBURY BRANCH

s a young private in the 1st Canterbury Boys' Brigade Company we used to camp in Landford, south of Salisbury. While on our annual camp we would go on a road trip to the Bovington Tank Museum and on another year we went to the Fleet Air Arm Museum, at RNAS Yeovilton, where I purchased one of the many mugs I have collected over the years.



Fast forward more than 30 years later, imagine my surprise and delight to receive an invitation to join the Salisbury Branch on 21 October as they visited 'behind the wire' at HMS Heron, RNAS Yeovilton. Admittedly I thought we were visiting the Museum, but image my glee to realise we were going to the side where the public are not permitted.

As I arrived and had my photo taken and attached to my pass that required that I be accompanied at all times (strange how this keeps cropping up!!) the person who was tasked with accompanying me was the Verger, our very own Tina Cullen. We were taken to the Base Chapel, St Augustine's, where we met with some of the Chaplains, talking about the life on the base.

Following tea (with another mug for my collection (given – not taken!)) we were driven off to the Historic Flight hangar where we were met by a sublieutenant who took us around.

Whilst there, we got to see the only airworthy Mk 1 Faiery Swordfish. The Swordfish, launched from HMS Victorious, was responsible for hitting the rudder of the German Battleship Bismark which sank on 27 May 1941. It should be noted that the Swordfish at RNAS Yeovilton was not one of those involved in the hunt for the Bismark.

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Moving upwards saw a Mk II Swordfish, while not air-worthy, was a sight to behold, we went on to see a Hawker Sea Fury, where our own Martin Taylor managed to hop on up to take a good look inside.

As we moved around we got to see a rather strange helicopter, the Westland Wasp, which looked like it was missing a lot of its bodywork, however this was intentional to make it as light as possible for using at sea. This helicopter was retired from service in 1981, but then returned to service for the Falkland's War in 1982.



We were then taken into a fenced off area to get a view (albeit it restricted owing to H&S restrictions) of the Sea Vixen that, following difficulty with its landing gear, was forced to make

a belly-landing at RNAS Yeovilton in 2017 – it is great to see that this has not benched this magnificent aircraft as they are working on restoring it to airworthiness.

We then, getting more up to date, we went to see a Sea Harrier and the Phantom, seeing the Royal Navy aircraft from 1934–2006.

Following lunch, back at the Chapel, we went off-base to St Bartholomew's Church. The Church was deemed as unsafe and was made redundant in 1988. The RNAS purchased the church to become the Anglican Church for RNAS Yeovilton in 1992 for £1.00. This beautiful church is now used for regular services following a huge amount of

fundraising. It was rededicated on 11 November 1993.







Within this church they have a Stone Altar that was rediscovered after being hidden in the ground for over 500 years, now topped with glass to ensure the Chalice does not topple while in use.

This was a fantastic day, seeing beautiful aircraft, meeting members who I have not seen for a while and the opportunity to give an update on what is happening regarding the future of the Guild.

Julie Avril Masters 1934 – 2019

t was a huge honour to attend the Service of Thanksgiving for Julie Masters on 25th November 2019 with other Chichester, Guildford and Portsmouth members. Julie was an active Associate member



for many years serving with her husband Keith at Chichester Cathedral. The service was held in the Lady Chapel the Cathedral which was filled and overflowing with family, friends and colleagues. A touching Eulogy full of fond memories was given by her eldest grandson Liam, followed by a very warm and thoughtful Address by Revd Canon Tim Schofield. "May she rest in peace, and rise in glory."

Stephen John Guy 13th December 1960 – 4 September 2019

n Monday 16th September, in a most beautiful service of thanksgiving, family, colleagues and friends said goodbye to Stephen and gave thanks to God for his life amongst us. Stephen had served at Hereford Cathedral as a

verger for 21 years, a self-effacing man, he loved his role and loved his cathedral and in turn was loved and respected and highly valued by so many whose lives he touched.

In 2016 he had been diagnosed with Non-Hodgkin T-cell Lymphoma. He underwent two rounds of chemotherapy bravely bearing the effects of the treatment. In May 2017, following a period of remission and further treatment, he underwent stem cell treatment at the QE in Birmingham – his brother David being a match. He was later told that he was in complete remission and he and his husband Dave started planning a big trip to the USA and Canada.



In 2019, the cancer returned and nothing more could be done. He was given between two weeks and two months to live. Due to his faith, strength and courage he continued for over four months and died peacefully at home with his husband Dave and beloved Westie Rio by his side. During

his last months he planned and created the beautiful service we attended.


