

NATIONAL CHAIRMAN'S LETTER



NATIONAL CHAPLAIN'S LETTER



Dear Friends

We have all entered the long journey of discipline, silence, fasting and prayer through Lent which will bring us to the foot of the cross. As we travel we will be changed and the change will sometimes be difficult, dangerous and will cause us pain and grief.

However, Lent is all about change – the change which will allow us to share in the glory of the resurrection with our Lord Jesus even though we must first trudge through the desert

As a very small child, my mother had a friend who began every conversation with the words, 'The world is very evil ...' and she would then continue in her miseries about food rationing, the bombing, the decadence of the youth or whatever was on her mind. Evil was foremost in her reckoning! Following his baptism, Jesus is driven out into the wilderness: that place of hunger, silence, loneliness and fear to confront evil but develops a strategy for obedience to the Father's will. Jesus is now conscious of his true vocation and the exceptional powers with which he has been endowed. He has heard the voice 'You are my Son' and now he must confront the source of the promptings in the wilderness and discern the source. Is the voice the same as before – the same as the one which said 'You are my Son' or is a voice which tempts him to do evil? The 'devil' invests the story, at least to our modern ears, with a certain degree of superstition and unreality but the devil is a mythical figure – a pictorial way of expressing truths not readily expressed in any other way.

As my mother's friend realized, evil is real and potent in our world and it is personal – we have the choice as to whether to serve and obey God or whether to rebel. The tension between doing the good and doing the evil is often very tight: in fact we live on a knife edge. Evil is often distorted good for evil perverts the good gifts of God and often masquerades as good and misleads us into doing the right thing but for the wrong reason. Evil masks the true love of God. Temptation is to do what is attractive, and the most subtle of our temptations is to do what appears to be good, but with ulterior motive.

The word, to 'tempt' here, as indeed throughout the Bible, is not so much to entice to sin but rather to test the godly in his/her fidelity to God. In the Old Testament there is a long tradition of God testing those whom he loved and now Jesus is subjected to temptation to enable him to understand the nature of his mission and to accomplish the divine purpose of bringing in the kingdom of love.

The devil's voice may have appeared like a string of natural ideas to Jesus. If Jesus can convert stones into bread, surely that would be a good idea. God cannot want his Son or his people to starve!

Presently Jesus will feed the multitude as indeed he feeds us at the Eucharist. If God wants Jesus to be sovereign over the world, then why not demonstrate this power now at the beginning of his ministry? Jesus teaches and acts with authority but all is done for the glory of the Father.

If Jesus really is the Messiah could he not prove it by some spectacular display of power? Later Jesus was to heal the sick, restore sight to the blind and raise the dead to life – all spectacular actions but performed out of compassion and love. Notice that Jesus does not argue with the devil, for arguments are often a way of playing with the idea until we convince ourselves that the temptation is right and good, Jesus simply quotes scripture thus putting himself under the authority of scripture and thus under the authority of God.

All Christian people are tested at the points which matter most to them in their lives and vocation. The voice of prompting needs to be discerned – is it the voice of God, or it is an attractive lie?

Resisting temptation means keeping awake – recognizing when we have the choice. The danger is not so much in saying 'No' to God, but rather in the failing to recognize that we are being offered a choice, such that we do not realize that we are saying 'No'. There is no room for complacency.



Fighting temptation is not about selfhatred or the denial of parts of our God-given humanity but it is about honesty and celebrating the gift of humanity so that we and those we serve may have life; life in all its fullness.

I wish you all a blessed and holy Lent and a joyous Easter.

He died in December 2012 aged 74. Over 200 people attended his funeral service on 4th January. People came to give thanks for Harry's full and wonderful life. The crowded church showed that our friend was much in his community. We mourned with his dear wife, Norma, and the family.

Harry was born in Sheffield above a grocery shop. Before he took on the duties as Verger and Hall Manager he was a taxi driver. He took especial care for the elderly in the town. He had an HGV licence, so, maybe this helped with heavy folk in his taxi service. During Harry's National Service he served in the Malayan jungle, Jordan and Aden. He enjoyed many interests. He was a member of the Society of Saint Francis and the Saint John's ambulance Service. He and Norma went line dancing four times a week. Harry's Vicar said in his address, 'He did everything that needed doing in the church. He was a true friend. He allowed space for the Clergy in their preparations. He was much loved by the children, having a dry, jocular Yorkshire wit. Harry as a friend to all experienced a personal faith in Jesus.' This was reflected in the Vicar's text from John's Gospel 'In him was life, and the life was the light of men.' We shall miss this dear man of God at our Branch functions very much. He lives on in our hearts.

He chose 'Love Divine, all loves excelling', 'Just as I am, without one plea', (his favourite hymn, and which summed up his faith), and 'Thine be the glory', for his funeral service which was conducted by the Reverend Martin Keighley, Vicar of Saint Chad's and our former Branch Chaplain. He spoke of Arthur's strong faith, dedication to duty as Verger and to his family. He read the following eulogy which was written by Arthur's much loved daughter, Rachel.

To paraphrase the 'Singing Postman' - "Arthur's a rum ol'boy and there in't much he don't know." The man I had the honour of calling my Dad was a rum ol'boy and derived the epithet 'Grumpy' thanks to me waking him at 6 a.m. And him protesting "middle of the night". He adored being Verger, and was proud he had "Seen 'em come, and seen 'em go," but, "he wasn't goin' anywhere" himself. He was happiest with his family, friends and animals. He told many tales of his Mum's pot bellied pig, he talked about fishing with Garry, and going about seeing animals and God's creation with Mum and I.

The love of his life was my wonderful Mum, Elsa, and at Huddersfield they formed a Ballroom Dancing Society and she got him into classical music. He couldn't read music but his determination meant he learnt to play the harmonica. His eyes lit up when he played, even though the cat did not appreciate the noise! He loved 'unhealthy' food, pulled a face at 'foreign' or any 'leaves' and made chocolate bars disappear in bed over night. I admired his honesty. He spoke his mind, a spade was a spade, and told you exactly what he thought. He was a very spiritual man who loved |God and his Church. He had a lot of love for his family and friends. I am so honoured to have had such an amazing Dad and I hope to emulate him and make him proud in the future. Keep 'a trolshin' Dad, love you loads. R.

Robert Sly, his successor, verged him at the funeral and laid his verge on the coffin during the service. Ten other Branch members were present and formed 'guard of honour' at the door as he left the church.

JOHN ROYCROFT 1938 - 2013

My Dad, John, the youngest of four children, was born in Wallasey on 5th January 1938, two months earlier than expected. His incubator was a shoe box full of cotton wool next to the roaring fire being fed every two hours before progressing to a drawer as he gained strength. As a child growing up in Wallasey he sang in the local Church Choir and like to play 5-a-side football. This interest in football created a lifelong Everton fan out of him. He always enjoyed attending their matches when he could. Playing football got him one of many head injuries which he sustained during his life, the first being when the ball was kicked into the road and he ran after it and straight into the door handle of a moving car leaving him with a scar.

At the age of 15 his first job took him to the docks at Liverpool, working in a local shipping company. After this he completed two years National Service. During his early days in the army he was placed on a special diet to increase his weight, a theme which continued throughout his life as he always had a good appetite but never put on any weight. After his time in the army he went back to the shipping company. I remember him telling me about a ship, when he went aboard the Captain asked him if he wanted a drink but he declined. However, the Russian Captain insisted. Anyone who knew him knows he wasn't a drinker. After sharing a bottle of some alcoholic beverage he had to get back to the dock, but to get back he had to climb over two ships. Once back in his office he could hardly stand up, so goodness only knows how he did not end up in the water and he was sent home by the secretaries in a taxi.

In 1960 he commenced a job working for the YHA in Earls Court. His life changed in 1968 when he returned to Wallasey for Christmas. During this time he met Mum and they were married in October 1969. Shortly after they moved to North Wales with the YHA. Their first child, my sister Olwen, arrived soon after in 1970. In 1972 Dad, Mum and Olwen moved Aysgarth with the YHA. In 1974 I was born, followed by Joan in 1977.

In the 1980's Dad became a keen runner, participating in and completing thirteen half marathons as well as three marathons, he even managed to persuade all the family to take part in the Herriot Half Marathon with Joan only 5 years old. I am pleased we all finished. Another family tradition was our annual trip to Butlin's. I recall one year him consuming half a shandy, falling over and breaking his jaw. This led to Mum liquidising his meals to enable him to consume them through a straw. In 1984 we said goodbye to Aysgarth and the YHA and moved to Catterick. In one job there Dad and his colleagues became competitive with each other, with Dad completing calculations in his head quicker than the others using a calculator.


Later in life Dad became the Verger at the Catterick Garrison Memorial Church, a job he enjoyed until his retirement. It was the Church we attended as a family and it enabled him to interact with a variety of people. This Church was always important to my Dad, along with his faith in God.

As we pay our respects our thoughts go to those who could not be with us, Dad's eldest daughter and my sister, Olwen, granddaughter, Madison, and grandsons, Joshua, Philip and Oscar, who sadly won't know their grandfather, but will hopefully come to enjoy hearing stories of his life through Joan and myself. Our last memory of Dad is visiting him at Hill Crest just before Christmas. During our visit he responded with the same old comments as always to the question 'Are you alright?' 'No, I'm half left, half right and a bit in the middle.' A phrase we will never forget.



By kind permission of the Vicar of Beverley Minster, the York Branch of the Church of England Guild of Vergers is hosting the York Province Festival at Beverley Minster.

Beverley Minster is one of the largest and most spectacular Parish Churches in England. From an original foundation around 700AD it was home to the relics of the second most important Saint in the north of England and subsequently one of the patron saints of England – St John of Beverley.

A remarkable survivor of the Reformation, it contains some of the finest surviving art and craftsmanship of the 13th, 14th and 16th centuries. Nicholas Hawksmoor copied its West Towers in his designs for the western face of Westminster Abbey.

Today the church serves the parish and the region and is also an active concert venue much-praised by local and international performers alike.



THE GUILD DIPLOMA COURSE



The Central Council of the Guild, at the recommendation of General Synod, formulated a course to cover the work and ministry of the Verger.

The course is formulated in four units set in two stages:

The first stage is the **Foundation** Unit, which comprises sixteen assignments, covering preparation for worship, care of the building, record-keeping, and archives, care of the churchyard, and caring for the people of God.

The second stage comprises the other three units:

The Verger as **Pastor** covers the individual's personal development, their relationship with the people and God, care for others, and for Church resources.

The Verger as **Historian** covers the history of church building, architecture, and the history of worship, including the Book of Common Prayer, and the Bible.

The Verger as **Administrator** covers communication, forms and registers, and the structures of the Church.

Students who complete the course successfully receive a diploma, an academic hood, and the right to use the post-nominal letters '**Dip.GV**'.

IPSWICH BRANCH

We would like to start this report with wishing everyone a belated: "Happy and Peaceful New Year" from all friends and colleagues of the Ipswich Branch. As we do not have our next branch meeting until 25th February, rather than not submit a report for this issue of the Verger Magazine, Tom (my husband) and I thought we would write about our area of Kesgrave, Nr. Ipswich. On Sunday 17th December we walked along to our 'local' Church, All Saints, Kesgrave, for their evening Carol Service. Inside All Saints is a mixture of old traditional and new build (extension). The one thing I did want to write about was their frontal, although All Saints do not have what I would consider a 'traditional' High Altar, therefore, the frontals have to hang behind the Altar. Theirs was very modern with a picture depicting the scene of Mary, Joseph and baby Jesus, a shepherd, king and animals all seated underneath and on a tree, such as 'The tree of life'. Whoever made the frontal is extremely talented and very inspirational.

Another Church, further along towards Ipswich is Saint Augustine's, which is situated on the eastern side of Ipswich, serving a large and varied congregation. (Ipswich was founded around 600AD as a small settlement close to the river Orwell). Until the Orwell Bridge was opened in 1982, traffic to or from Felixstowe, came through the Parish and past Saint Augustine's. We were passing by ourselves one evening and had to stop to take some photographs of the lovely Christmas tree that was erected outside. The church is remembered by many people for the illuminated Cross high above the tower. It continues to be a local landmark and on a dark evening the Cross is highly visible and appears to be suspended in the night sky. Saint Augustine's was given by a local tailor, Charles Howard Bantoft, and the land on which the church is built was given by Lady de Saumarez, a wealthy local benefactor. A plaque in the church commemorates the gift:



This Church has been given by an Ipswich tradesman as a thank offering to Almighty God for the Blessing of a pious and affectionate Mother 1927


During the course of the meeting, Nigel Skayman of Saint Barnabas Church, Mitcham, who had only been a member of the Guild for a year, offered his services as the Branch Secretary. He was subsequently proposed, seconded and elected as the new Secretary. The other three posts, Treasurer (Irene Money), Branch Correspondent (Alan Taylor) and Events Co-ordinator (Carole Sharp) were all re-elected. The Area Leader Stephen Haude gave a vote of thanks to our outgoing Chairman for all his hard work over the previous two years.

The Church of Saint James, Garlickhythe, was first mentioned in a will dated about 1100. The name of the church is derived from hythe or jetty where garlic was imported in the Middle Ages when the church stood on the banks of the River Thames.

After the Great Fire of 1666, Sir Christopher Wren rebuilt the Church at a cost of 5,357.10 shillings. The foundation stone was laid in 1676 and the re-opening took place on 10th December 1682. Apart from Saint Paul's, the forty foot high ceiling is the highest in the City of London.

There are ten Livery Companies in The City who regularly use the Church and who have all contributed greatly to its restoration and its maintenance. At the head of the River Pageant for Diamond Jubilee in 2012 was a barge ringing bells. These became the new bells of the Church of Saint James, Garlickhythe.

Following the AGM a service of Holy Communion took place conducted by Father Tom Cameron. Our National Chaplain preached the sermon in which she spoke about the life of George Herbert who wrote a book called "The Country Parson" in 1652



The evening finished with a delightful selection of food and wine to end a very enjoyable AGM. Our thanks go to the Reverend Guy Treweek and his staff for their hospitality.
