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NATIONAL CHAPLAIN'S LETTER



Dear Friends

We are almost on the pilgrimage through Lent when we prepare for times of change. I don't think any of us really enjoy change but unless we change we die!

During Lent it is the change within our own lives that concerns us most. The *metanoia* – turning round to face in the opposite direction: what we usually refer to as repentance. Lent is opportunity, the opportunity to 'fall in love with God' all over again.

When we accept the Christian faith, we are usually excited by this concept of 'falling in love'; of becoming closer to God through our prayers, but as our lives trundle on, it becomes less of a challenge and perhaps less of a reality.

Augustine wrote: 'True, whole prayer is nothing but love.' During this season of Lent perhaps we could resolve to search for an enhanced relationship with God through our prayers. Of course, God knows all the secrets of our hearts, but like a parent, even if God knows everything about us, he still wants us to come to him to try to articulate our innermost desires and concerns.

Prayer is an adventure which leads us to the living God, not in that vague place we call 'heaven' but in the middle of our messy lives, in the here and now. The culmination of this adventure is to know God and to know our own needs and desires. As we enter Holy Week try to make some time for meditating on the suffering and the death of our Lord Jesus. Try to enter into it as though you were standing there before him. You might like to use the appended picture to aid your meditation. The picture is by Geertgen tot Sant Jans [1465 – 1495] and is entitled 'Man of Sorrows'.



Jesus, bleeding and exhausted carries his cross watched by his Mother and Mary Magdalene. The cross seems almost too heavy for him. He is supported by angels bearing the instruments of his passion.

'Behold and see if there is any sorrow like unto my sorrow.'

Look into the eyes of Jesus and bear the suffering with him. Look into your own life and give to him your suffering and pain for he will bear it for you.

During Lent is not only our life of prayer that sometimes needs to move forward but other aspects of our lives as well. It is time for the Guild to move forward, retaining the things that are wonderful: our fellowship with each other, the activities we take part in within our Branches, but it is time to change some of the ways we ran the Guild when life was different.

We now have fewer Branches and so there is a plan to rationalize how the Guild is organized, so you will have seen from the Paper sent round that the proposal is to have larger areas each containing four/five Branches. We hope that this will give us greater flexibility in choosing representatives and Guild officers. As some Branches have closed, we do not want to lose members so there will be a central membership so that they may be included. Please do read the paper carefully and prayerfully and let your Area Leader know your own thoughts.

THE DIPLOMA COURSE



The Central Council of the Guild, at the recommendation of General Synod, formulated a course to cover the work and ministry of the Verger. The course is formulated in four units set in two stages:

The first stage is the **Foundation** Unit, which comprises of sixteen assignments, covering preparation for worship, care of the building, record-keeping, and archives, care of the churchyard, and caring for the people of God.

The second stage comprises of the other three units:

The Verger as **Pastor** covers the individual's personal development, their relationship with the people and God, care for others, and for Church resources.

The Verger as **Historian** covers the history of church building, architecture, and the history of worship, including the Book of Common Prayer, and the Bible.

The Verger as Administrator covers communication, forms and registers, and the structures of the Church.

Students who complete the course successfully receive a diploma, an academic hood, and the right to use the postnominal letters '**Dip.GV**'.

THE WAY FORWARD



While we are looking at how we can address the diminishing number of Areas we are also looking at how the overall Management of the National Guild should be defined. It has been already stated that local Branches are not being affected; you will continue to meet in your Branches and enjoy the Fellowship and Friendship that you have always enjoyed.

We, in the Central Council, and Standing Committee, have been working on how to safeguard the Guild for many years to come and ensure that we have the right rules to help us to do this.

Your Area Leaders should now have spoken with all branches on what is being done, namely:

- To acknowledge that technology (email, mobile phones etc) has progressed to the point that we are able to communicate far easier than we were able to 20 years ago.
- That some of our Branches are struggling and therefore have to amalgamate with neighbouring Branches or become Headquarter Members.
- That Area Leaders which once looked after multiple Branches are, by most, now only looking after a single Branch.
- That if we do nothing the Guild, as we know it, may cease to be.

To this end, we are looking at restructuring the Areas, so that the elected Regional Representative will once again be covering a number of Branches and bring the voice of you all to the Management of the Guild, and in turn bring the voice of the National Guild to you. We are also looking at a new Constitution that will be fit for current purpose, while also being future proof, allowing the committee structures to be changed within Statues more easily than having to re -write the whole Constitution each time.

There is of course is a timetable for this to be reached, with already nearly 18 months having been spent consulting on this. As Branches need to receive four months-notice of any change of the Constitution prior to it being voted on at the AGM, the Central Council, which meets in March, will be asked to approve these changes so that we can then present them to you for adoption. While it may seem that this is fast, we are acutely aware that momentum must be kept up so as not to lose sight of the end – the Future of our Guild.





In September 2018, we were invited to a BBQ at Ron Griffiths' home in Urmston, Manchester, and 11 members and friends had a very enjoyable time with plenty of good food. The weather was ideal and great fun was had by all. We raised money towards Saint Clements Church Rose window.

On 22nd November 2018, we admitted two new members to the Branch at a Eucharist service held in Manchester Cathedral. This was well supported by members of the Branch.

In December, 4 of us attended the Liverpool Branch Advent Eucharist and Christmas Lunch at Liverpool Cathedral. As usual this was a very harmonious event with the usual Grand Raffle and lovely meal.

In January, we held our AGM in Chester Cathedral. This was attended by 15 members of the Branch. We started by joining the local congregation at the morning Eucharist during which we admitted our new Branch Chaplain to the Guild. Canon Rhodes is the beekeeper at Manchester Cathedral. We were very pleased to at last have a Branch Chaplain, having been without one for 12 months.



We have a few things lined up for 2019, among them will be a Lenten Service at Manchester Cathedral on 11th March to be led by our new Branch Chaplain; a trip to Blackburn Cathedral on 25th March when we will have a time of fellowship with 5 prospective new vergers. We will be explaining the duties of vergers and the origins of the Guild, we hope they will decide to become full members; we have been invited to Pam Derbyshire's Church in Scorton in September. There are also other trips on the books but these have not been finalised as yet.

Our Chairman, Gareth Screeton was proud to announce the birth of his first child, a daughter, in September, and the Senior Virger at Chester Cathedral announced the adoption of a son to expand his family. A time of great celebration in both families.

JEANNE BARBARA SCOTT 27th August 1932 – 30th October 2018

Jeanne was the youngest of four children born to parents Walter and Edith Scott, starting her life in Leyton, Essex, an area in which she was to spend her earlier years. The Family were shopkeepers, initially in charge of a general store before branching out with the purchase of a builder's yard and it was here that Jeanne learned her practical skills which were put to good use in her later days, as can be vouched for by the many individuals, and Saint John's Church, High Wycombe, all of whom benefited from her carpentry and other D.I.Y. skills.

In her early years, Jeanne trained as a Comptometer Operator, moving into the insurance industry in the London market, eventually becoming part of an audit team tyat travelled around the country. Although still living in the Essex area and commuting into London, family circumstances changed and in the early 1980's she moved to High Wycombe, purchasing the house wherein she lived until a few years ago. By this time she had been promoted and was a Superintendent of the Statistics Department of a major marine insurance company in the City, but, when it was proposed to move her department to Bristol, she called it a day and took early retirement.

By now Jeanne had become a member of Saint John the Evangelist Church in High Wycombe and it wasn't long before she was actively involved in many connected aspects thereof including the role of Verger (succeeding Peter Hudson and myself). She became a founder member of the Oxford Branch of the Guild, which was formed in June 1988, becoming part of its Management Team (a position which she held for some 18 years).

In 2002, the Central Council of the Guild were seeking a new General Secretary and Jeanne's name was put forward – one of six. She was duly elected and took up this role in 2003, a position she fulfilled until her 'retirement' in 2009.

For her services to the Guild she was made a Life Member. In 2016, owing to her deteriorating health and mobility restrictions, Jeanne resigned her role as Administrator of the Oxford Branch and, although remaining a member, her attendance at Branch functions diminished. At those she did attend, however, she was still able to recall and relate (in her authoritative manner) to a very attentive audience, the many stories in her repertoire of past experiences – she was much loved and respected.

Having downsized from her home at 309, Desborough Avenue (for many years the hub for the administration of both the Oxford Branch and the National Guild), and then into a care home, Jeanne passed away on 30th October.

A service for family and close friends was held at the Breakspear Crematorium, Ruislip, on Tuesday 20th November, 2018, followed by a Memorial Service held the following day at Christ the Servant King, High Wycombe. At the latter service the Guild were represented by, not only Branch members, but also current and past members of Central Council whom Jeanne had worked with over many years.

I, personally, had a great admiration of and a fond affection for, Jeanne, through thick and thin and I know she was an influence in many people's lives through her generosity, support, guidance and a love for Our Lord. We give thanks for her varied ministry.

John,

I am writing to you as you will no doubt have seen reports in the media that I have indicated that I plan to retire on 10th June 2020. As your Patron, I thought that it would be helpful to make you aware of the consequences of my retirement. I am your Patron because I hold office as Archbishop of York.

When I cease to hold that office on 10th June 2020 I will no longer be your Patron, and my successor will become Patron in my place. You may be aware that there are a number of legal steps to be taken before my successor can take up office as Archbishop of York, and so there is likely to be a short gap between the date of my retirement and the formal appointment of my successor as Archbishop.

However, as it is the usual practice to make a public announcement of the name of a new Archbishop before they are formally appointed, so you will be able to follow this in the media.

It has been a great honour to be your Patron. Please rest assured that I will remain as your Patron until my retirement in 2020, and very much value my continuing relationship with you during that time.

I would be grateful if you could confirm receipt of this letter by completing the attached form and sending it to my chaplain by email or by post.
