

## Meet your National Life Members: The Rev'd Canon James Wilson



t has been 22 years since I left St Mary Redcliffe as a Verger to start my training for ordination. 30 years since a tall and, yes, young Head Verger of Carlisle Cathedral asked if I would hold a ladder whilst he hoovered the walls of that beautiful building. I was a volunteer guide and was fascinated by the varied work the vergers undertook. They are cleaners, historians, liturgists, planners, floral artists, security, cashiers but most importantly they were the visible face of the cathedral, with generally a smile and a cup of coffee for those in need. It was not long before James Armstrong had managed to glean everything about me. He helped me come to terms with so much of who I am by being there simply to listen, a gift so often in short supply today.



I learnt so much at Carlisle, such as how to learn about your building by cleaning it! How to plan a service not simply with words but including the movement within it. But most of all I learnt, as a gay man, that I was not despised by the church, even though time and again we all feel excluded and rejected. James encouraged me, as he has done for many, to move to Bristol for a verger's post at St Mary Redcliffe, and I would not have coped without our chats. As I became a member of the Guild, I met more people that had given their lives to serve in the church as the welcomer and enabler. They came in all shapes, sizes, genders and sexualities and yet all shared the same calling. A perfect model of the church. 22 years on, I am in touch with many, and I am proud to call many vergers, friends. But it was those that were not afraid to be who they were that strengthened me more and gave me confidence. People like David Dorey and Keith Nelson, both sadly no longer with us, who encouraged me so much to be myself. David even said I had nice Latties!

That is why, at 56, as a member of the College of Canons at Bristol Cathedral, Vicar of St Gregory the Great, I have been emboldened to be who I am and have been active in promoting the national churches course "Living in Love and Faith". I hope that it will encourage others not to be fearful of who they are, that they are made in God's image and are capable of loving and being loved. I am so blessed with my Civil Partner, Professor Tom Smith, who often acts as Vicar's Spouse at the events of our church and at the cathedral.

I will be appearing soon on a National Church film concerning the course. If your Church has not done so encourage them to do so, if you feel you have not got the time or feel you will not be heard, make time as you will be. No matter where you are coming from in the discussion it's vital we talk. Maybe your branch could organise a course? Or even the National Guild? The power of Zoom (the internet) has opened up many more opportunities to meet. The Guild has always had one primary and almost sacred calling. That is to be a place of sharing and listening to each other. At its best, it is the sanctuary for the tired and over-worked, a place of learning from each other. But most of all a place where we can stop and chat over a drink and simply be ourselves.

Dressed immaculately in his black cassock and robe, with black gloves, Geoffrey (or as we used to call him, to his amusement - Darth Timms) was so precise in everything he did. He was a stickler for time keeping and woe betide if you were running behind schedule.

Geoffrey was admitted as a full member of the Church of England Guild of Vergers, on 27th March 1995. He has, over that time carried out a number of duties within our local branch. Every role that Geoffrey held, he carried out with his utmost care, diligence and pride. He made a lot of friends during his time in the Guild and many of those members send their condolences, thoughts and prayers to you, his family at this time.

During the Service of Admission to the Guild, the candidate affirms their agreement to uphold certain rules and principles.

Geoffrey, like the rest of us Guild members here today, gave his response to the questions asked of him. However, he didn't just answer these in word alone, but in action throughout the 26 years he was a proud verger. The questions asked are these: Will you support the Aims and Objects of the Church of England Guild of Vergers?

### He did.

Will you care for the House of God, for the people who worship and the people who visit there?

He did.

Will you endeavour to follow the example of Christ in your daily life?

### That he did and so much more.

He is the epitome of what a Verger should be. He gave so much to this (the) church, the Guild and to the God which he served.

He was, for many the first person you came into contact with when visiting St. Mary's. For us as funeral directors, and for visitors.. and his church family alike, he was that safe pair of hands.

## All in a day's work - notes from a Dean's Vergers Diary

### Tuesday 29th May 2018

**06:15** The day starts well, not warm, but mild - mild and bright - I walk to the cathedral and prepare to open up.

**06:30** Opening the south west door of the cathedral I am greeted with a; hanging sleeping bag, a back pack and several paper products arrayed on the ramp and railings of the entrance, on the east green is a naked male performing a cross between a sacred dance and an alien ritual!

**08:00** I excuse myself from attending Holy Communion, to chaperone (from a distance) the Succentor who is in deep conversation with said trench-coated chap who has, in addition to his pink bra, displayed that he is wearing stockings!

**08:30** Chap given a cup of tea and leaves quietly.

12:30 Holy Communion in the Retro Choir, all is set, but as the clock strikes, indicating the start of the device, there is deadly silence. Thinking that there is a malfunction with the mics I check the sound system for malfunction - all is well. I return to the retrochoir to investigate where I find a congregation of c15 sat in silent meditation and the celebrant sat 'asleep' in his chair. He had entered a few minutes early, put chalice etc. on the altar and sat to await the clock striking 12:30 and nodded off!






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### **LINCOLN BRANCH**

### LONDON, SOUTHWARK & CHELMSFORD BRANCH VISIT TO CHELSEA OLD CHURCH

The Church that stands on Chelsea Embankment overlooking the River Thames dates back to the 13th Century. It was totally destroyed by a direct hit



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from a heavy bomb in 1941. It was rebuilt and reconsecrated in 1958 attended by the Queen Mother.

Chelsea Old Church remains faithful to BCP worship and is part of the Prayer Book Society. Saint (Sir) Thomas More was a regular worshipper during the 15th century and his statue stands outside overlooking the Thames, close to where



his official barge was moored to take him to Westminster and Hampton Court.

Oliver Harcus, justifiably proud of his church, gave us a fascinating outline of its history and then virged our procession for a BCP service of Holy Communion celebrated by Revd Brian Leathard, Rector of St Luke's, Chelsea. Fr Brian is helping Chelsea Old Church during its current interregnum. Our branch Chaplain, Revd Canon John Ackland preached the sermon.

This was followed by afternoon tea kindly provided by Olivers' Mum. It was a delightful visit and we thank Oliver and his church for making us feel so welcome.

Val Jeffery 1933 - 2021

Val Jeffery of East Anglia Branch has died at the age of 88. As with everything to which Val belonged, she was an enthusiastic and committed member from her first meeting to her last and loyally served her local church in Aldeburgh for many years.

Val was renowned for her cheerful welcome and hospitality; she and husband, fellow verger Dick hosted the annual general meeting with a BBQ for many years.

Val had a phenomenal memory for people and enjoyed a wide circle of friends. She remembered their life stories and marked their birthdays and anniversaries. She had an immaculate dress sense, was prepared to call a spade a spade and speak her mind but was also a very good listener.

Val's funeral in Aldeburgh Parish Church on 22nd September, was attended by almost 300 people and



she was verged in and out of church by two vergers, Margaret Craggs and lan Cobb. General Secretary Stephen Stokes, and vergers Pam Cobb and Linda Denness were also in attendance.

The service was most moving, uplifting and whilst appropriate to the occasion for giving thanks to God for her life, had its lighter moments. It was Val's specific wish that her 'going out' music would be to the quirky "Birdie Song" and wanted the congregation to be encouraged to join in with the actions. And so, they did; with a smile on their lips having paid great tribute to a remarkable lady.

### June Harris 1934 -2021

June was born in Ipswich in 1934. She was 7 years old when she was baptised at St Augustine's Church, Ipswich where she was a faithful member for the rest of her life. She left school at 14 but suffered with ear, nose and throat problems which affected her hearing and eyesight permanently.

June first met Robin when he bought his lunch from the bakery where she worked. This eventually led to courtship and their marriage in 1968. June and Robin adopted their son Gregory in 1973. June became actively involved with the church becoming a member of The Family Life Group and the Mothers Union at St Augustine's.

June and Robin became joint Vergers at St Augustine's and were officially enrolled into the guild in January 1999. They retired as Vergers in 2013 but retained their membership.

In 2018 June had a horrendous fall and in 2020 suffered a stroke taking 90% of her sight and another stroke her speech. Despite her suffering greatly, she bore it bravely with courage and a smile.

June's funeral took place on Monday 25th October. She was verged in by our Branch Chairman Ian Cobb. May God bless you – Rest in peace.

**Marjorie Wakeling** lost her brave fight against cancer in March last year. She had a graveside funeral at the time. Saturday 30th October finally saw a memorial service held at St Augustine's church, Ipswich. It was a celebration of her life and her strong faith. Nine Vergers were in attendance as well as many church members. Several people got up and spoke about how Marjorie's faith had impacted upon their lives. She is greatly missed by all who knew her.

## A VERGER IN GENEVA

oly Trinity Anglican Church in Geneva, Switzerland was built in 1853 and has had a verger for many years - perhaps since the beginning. Whilst working on the Diploma Foundation Unit I came across an article in the church Council's Minutes in 1937 stating that the verger was accused of not cleaning the floor properly. I joined the church in 1974 and have always known a verger, so when the last verger left in 2008, and I had just stepped down from being warden, I suggested to our then incumbent that I take on that role. He readily agreed but, when I asked what exactly I was supposed to do, his reply was "Whatever you want to do" ! As at that time our wardens had a lot to do with an interregnum, I just carried on one or two of the tasks I had had as warden, i.e. training sidespeople and servers, checking on some of the supplies, etc. So when I discovered the Guild of Vergers and the Diploma Course, I was quite excited – at last I would find out what the verger's job really entailed.

I must admit that it was a bit of a shock when I received the first part – the Foundation Unit. However, I got stuck in and found it all extremely interesting. Of course, living in Geneva, Calvin's city, I had to look seriously into the Reformation and its effects and made several trips to the cathedral (even though Protestant, it is still called the cathedral) and the crypt which is an archeological site.

The course is for cathedral vergers as well as parish vergers, which means that not everything applies to me (e.g. we have no graveyard here). However, it has shown me where I can be of more help and what I should keep an eye on, and has encouraged me to play a more welcoming role.

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I do thank the Guild of Vergers for having put this course together, the Training Officer and the Assessors for all the work they do, and especially to Susan Ansell for her encouragement and support.

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ROUNDUP

hen we engaged with the restructure of the Guild a short while ago, one of the main areas that needed to be amended was the Constitution. As we reported at the AGM one of the things which we overlooked was the wording regarding the Statutes. We have, as many you now know, 3 levels of our working documents:

- The Job Descriptions these are able to be amended by consensus of the Standing Committee as job rôles change (providing that they still fulfil the rôles laid out in the Statutes and Constitution) and are able to be amended to reflect this.
- The Statutes these are the working 'nuts and bolts' of the Guild, and lay out the working of the Guild. Anything in this area may be amended by consensus of the Executive Committee.
- The Constitution this is the Backbone of the Guild and any amendments can only be made with consensus of the Membership at the AGM.

Unfortunately, we have noted that the wording in the Constitution stipulates that amendments of the Statutes can only be amended by consensus of the Membership at the AGM. This was an oversight, so we are working with the Executive Committee to amend this wording and this will be presented to the next AGM for amendment, should the Executive back it.

We have also been listening to you regarding how to pay for Conference and Shop merchandise, that some of you prefer not to pay by bank transfer. We are now introducing a SumUp device for both the Shop and Conference, this will enable you to pay cash (for the shop), or by card (for both the shop and Conference). We will be able to generate an invoice and you will be able to pay, securely, using your card online – this ensures that we do not have access to your card details. When the Shop is open in person, you will still be able to pay by cash or with your card, using Tap and Pay or chip & PIN as you prefer. We will still also be able to receive cheques if this is your preferred payment method. As you will see in this edition, there are many rôles available to be filled at the next AGM. Completed Nominations Forms must be received by the General Secretary by 1 March 2022, these rôles will be shortlisted by the Executive Committee at the March Meeting. We will be writing to you, via your Branch Officers, in early March. This will enable you to give your thoughts to the Regional Representatives to assist their decisions on the shortlist.

The main area that we discussed was the centralisation of magazine sending. We have reported in the past that we have noticed that, on occasion, it can take over a month from the magazines being sent to the Branches to you receiving them. We do acknowledge how busy each of us are, and that on occasion the magazine Distributor may receive the magazines when they are away and they have to wait until they are back. The intention is that we will send them to you direct from the printers, so that you get them earlier. There are many benefits of this; you get the magazine quicker, it is more timely (sometime the Advent Message has been received after Christmas), it takes a high level of burden off your Branch Officers, and it will decrease the Branches' postage costs. This will increase the National Capitation costs, but it should reduce the Branch Capitation costs, so the overall cost should equalise themselves out. However, in order for this to work, the General Secretary needs to have the correct details, and knowledge as to who receives a magazine. We would still send additional magazines that the Branches request to them as normal. The positive thing to take away from this is that there should be no change to receiving the magazine, but that receipt of a magazine should be closer to the print deadline.


