

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL CHAIRMAN



hile I was doing housework, I had the Disney film Christopher Robin on the television. It is a modern story of Winnie the Pooh and his friends and an adventure that unfolds in London. Some of it was filmed in Middle Temple while I worked at the Temple Church as Verger. At the end of the film, we see a grown-up Christopher Robin declaring his love for his family, which brought smiles from Pooh and his friends. Some of Pooh's friends, like Eeyore and Tigger, remind me of vergers. There are those whose cup is always only half-full and they grumble each week at the thought of extra work. There are those who are so bouncy and dynamic that they bring joy and light to their roles within the church and embracing change.

The Guild of Vergers has been through a great deal of change over the past few years. Processes have been tightened up and made more formal, coupled with the changes in our meetings as a result of Covid-19. Branches have met online, using Teams or Zoom. We currently have some outstanding national posts in the Guild that require members to be filled, and we are struggling to find folk to take on these duties. If you have the time and talents to assist the Guild, please let us know. Get involved or see us fold.

Finally, you will notice that the Chaplain's Letter is written by our newly appointed National Chaplain the Venerable Dr David Jenkins. I welcome him warmly to minister to the Guild and I am looking forward to his input and support. David will be leading our Conference this year, so please ensure that you book your place for West Malvern. Please continue to hold Mthr Rosemary in your prayers as she moves house and continues her treatment.

FROM THE DESK OF THE NATIONAL CHAPLAIN





Dear brother and sisters

May I begin my first letter as your National Chaplain by saying what a great honour it is to have been asked to fulfil this role. Please be assured of my prayers and support over the coming years and if I can ever be of assistance, please do not hesitate to contact me. I would be especially keen to be invited to Branch events either in person or by Zoom and at the time of writing we are trying to set up a Zoom meeting for the Branch Chaplains to meet with me.

May I continue this first epistle to you by thanking Mother Rosemary for all she has done in serving the Guild and in helping me to settle in. I am sure I speak for all of us as I wish her every blessing for the future.

I am writing this letter just on the cusp of Lent. The first signs of Spring are beginning to emerge, and I passed a wonderful sprinkling of snowdrops on my morning run today. I love this time of year. As a Christian, and as a priest, Lent, Holy Week and Easter has always been at the heart of my faith journey. These seasons never fail to refresh and renew me, physically, mentally, and spiritually. That sense of travelling from the sobriety and reflection of Ash Wednesday through the pain and humiliation of the Cross to the joy and glory of Easter moves me anew each year.

This year we commence that Lenten journey in the middle of a bruising time for the Church of England. The ongoing national conversations over sexuality and marriage have caused much pain and anxiety to many within and without the Church of England. Added to this challenge are the perennial concerns around the future of our parochial structures and the pressures on parish share and diocesan and cathedral budgets. All of this can make for uncertainty and tension.

Yet as vergers you are called to help keep the 'show on the road' regardless of the weather conditions and that, of course, is what you do with commitment and style! I have written elsewhere of how very aware I am of just how hard you all work and how committed you are to the role. Archdeacons (of which I am one) are sometimes referred to as the engine room of the Church of England and I have always regarded vergers as fellow participants in that role.

So as we enter this annual Lenten journey we recall both the cost of discipleship and its rich rewards. The *via crucis* is not an easy path but it is the way that leads to fullness of life in Christ and I thank you for inviting me to make that journey with you.

May I wish you all very blessing and a very prayerful Lent.



January

Cathedrals are of course multipurpose venues, being used for Services, events and in this photo a wonderful exhibition. "Threads through Creation" was comprised of a sequence of twelve huge textile panels retelling the creation story in the book of Genesis and our Chapter House gave it a home throughout January.



February

Verger's jobs are diverse and the duties differ from Cathedral to Cathedral and Church to Church. Here though is a job I'm sure most Vergers will have had to do at some point, making the Ash for Ash Wednesday; and in 2022 one of our Vergers had to contend with the elements to get it made!



March

Cathedrals reflect the Liturgical year through the colours found on vestments and altar frontals; here though, our Verger Gareth was able to capture it through our Nave lighting. Purple is the colour for Lent!



April

The joy of Easter day is always preceded by Holy Week and the sadness of Good Friday, when the Vergers strip all the altars of silverware and décor. This is a bare altar in one of our Chapels, with an Icon veiled behind, waiting for Easter.



May

Vergers open doors and turn the lights on for all who visit the Cathedral, and in May we saw the installation of our new glass West Porch doors. They allow us to have the Wooden Doors open so the city can see inside, but we can still keep the heat in! It has been described as the perfect fusion of Ancient and Modern and across the glass are images from the Churches in the diocese!



June



LIVING IN LOVE AND FAITH

he Church of England has recently released its response to the ongoing Living in Love and Faith process, this was presented to the General Synod in February which was adopted - with one amendment. They opened with the letter from the bishops who wrote:

"We want to apologise for the ways in which the Church of England has treated LGBTQI+ people - both those who worship in our churches and those who do not.

"For the times we have rejected or excluded you, and those you love, we are deeply sorry.

"The occasions on which you have received a hostile and homophobic response in our churches are shameful and for this we repent.

"As we have listened, we have been told time and time again how we have failed LGBTQI+ people.

"We have not loved you as God loves you, and that is profoundly wrong. We affirm, publicly and unequivocally, that LGBTQI+ people are welcome and valued: we are all children of God."

They went on to state:

The differences among you are also present among us, the College of Bishops. We are partnered, single, celibate, married, divorced, widowed, bereaved; heterosexual, gay, bisexual and same-sex attracted. We have diverse convictions about sexuality and marriage.

Within the Guild, we acknowledge that there are many differing views on this matter. Some will feel that the church has not gone far enough. Others will feel that the Church has gone too far. Yet we all acknowledge that we are all one in Christ.

We wish to affirm that all are welcome within the Guild no matter the demographic, gender, sexuality, marital status or any other identity or category.

We will continue to walk together in God's love with all.

A NOTE FROM OUR TREASURER

Conference Bursaries

We believe the Guild's Annual Training Conference and Retreat to be a valuable experience for any of our members; and it is a requirement for those completing the Guild's Diploma. Although hosting a four-day residential Training Conference is an unavoidably expensive business, we do not want anyone to be deterred from attending by cost alone, even amidst the current 'cost of living' crisis.

Some churches and cathedrals will agree to pay their vergers' conference fees, but sadly a great many do not. So the Guild has long operated a bursary fund, funded by donations from dioceses and bishops, which enables us to reduce the conference fees for vergers who might otherwise have difficulty attending; and we would like to encourage more members to take advantage of this. These bursaries are not solely for those in exceptionally dire straits – anyone living on a typical verger's salary and paying their own conference fee would likely be eligible for a modest discount if requested!

We are especially keen to encourage new Conference attendees, so have agreed a new policy that any first-time Conference delegate will automatically be offered a bursary of £100, without even needing to request it. Those who have attended our Conference before, or who think they might require an even larger discount, should contact the National Chaplain to enquire about a bursary.

Shop Manager

The Executive Committee seeks to appoint a new Shop Manager to run the shop stall at national events and sell stock by post the rest of the year. The Shop Manager would need some storage space at home (or church), a car for transport, and to usually be available to attend our two annual Festivals and Conference – for which their travel expenses would be reimbursed. FORTHCOMING ELECTIONS

he following roles' terms of office are due to come to an end at the next AGM, the current role holders are all eligible for re-election:

THE DIPLOMA COURSE

he Executive Committee of the Guild, at the recommendation of General Synod, formulated a course to cover the work and ministry of the Verger. The course is formulated in four units set in two stages:

The first stage is the **Foundation** Unit, which comprises sixteen assignments, covering preparation for worship, care of the building, record-keeping, and archives, care of the churchyard, and caring for the people of God.

The second stage comprises of the other three units:

- The Verger as **Pastor** covers the individual's personal development, their relationship with the people and God, care for others, and for Church resources.
- The Verger as **Historian** covers the history of church building, architecture, and the history of worship, including the Book of Common Prayer, and the Bible.

 The Verger as Administrator covers communication, forms and registers, and the structures of the Church.


Students who engage with the full four units are expected to attend at least one full CEGV Annual Training Conference prior to completion.


Those who complete the course successfully receive a diploma, an academic hood, and the right to use the postnominal letters '**Dip GV**'.

In the medieval period Lincoln was home for one of the largest Jewish communities in England and was home to Aaron the Jew who was famously wealthier than the King, Henry II. When he died they had to set up a new government department to handle his estate!. Members enjoyed a tour looking at Jewish sites in the city and in the Cathedral, guided by Dorothy Moss.

In October we held a special tea to celebrate member Sylvia Bird's 100th Birthday, Sylvia Turks was born in Birmingham's Bullring and her grandfather sold food off a barrow and out with his horse and cart. She went to Windsor Street School and enjoyed running. Spotted by a scout for Small Heath Harriers She ran for them and ran for England at White City in a careers that lasted from 1936 to 1954. At 14 she worked briefly for Norton Motorcycles before joining the Post Office and learning to type. Called up at 18 Sylvia worked making bullets. At 20 she met Aircraftsman Frank Bird who she married. They were together for sixty years receiving a card from the late Queen for their 60th wedding anniversary. She moved to Lincoln when her son took up work there.

In September we were again in Lincoln Cathedral for our 90th Anniversary Eucharist with the Acting Bishop of Lincoln, the Right Reverend Stephen Conway, Bishop of Ely. During the service ten new (and not so new) members of the Guild were admitted as members in what was a very enjoyable evening, finishing with a buffet supper in the Chapter House.

Our Christmas Lunch in November crowned the year with our guest speaker, the National Chairman John Kirby-Shearer.




Obituary Dr Stella Rogers (1931–2022)

n a blustery January evening a number of Vergers gathered at Hereford Cathedral to attend the funeral of Dr Stella Rogers, Associate Member of the Gloucester, Hereford & Worcester Branch.

Stella had served the Cathedral for many years as a Cathedral Guide and as a volunteer in the library she was also a faithful member of Evensong when her health allowed her. She was also a long-time friend to The Rev'd Canon Dr Maureen Palmer (onetime National Chaplain). Maureen wrote, about Stella, in the order of service that Stella was an only child and when she and her mother were evacuated to a farm on the edge of Dartmoor that this suited Stella, who threw herself into helping on the farm, to the despair of her mother, who wanted her daughter to wear pretty dresses and to hand round food when she had friends in to tea!

Stella was instrumental to the Guild in many areas, from helping Maureen with the material for the Vergers Conference, to setting up the Obit and Legacy Book. During her time at Winchester, while she was running the Thorold-Lyttleton Diocesan Library, she learnt calligraphy. This then went on to assisting the Cathedral in writing certificates in calligraphy for those who visited (which the Americans loved!).




Now, for most of us, a funeral service is bread and butter. This service, was however, different as it was incorporated with Evensong. This was such a beautiful service, at a service that Stella loved and attended, with the beautiful singing from the Choir. The music sung was *Ubi Caritas* by Maurice Duruflé, the *Evening Services in G minor* by Henry Purcell and the anthem *View me Lord* written by a former organist of Hereford Cathedral, Richard Lloyd. The Service ended with the *Kontakion of the Dead* from the Orthodox Funeral rite with the melody from the Kiev tradition.

What a truly meaningful and beautiful service to honour such a hardworking woman.
