Conference Bursaries

s we give thanks for another successful Annual Training Conference and Retreat, the booking forms are already being distributed for August 2024. Our venue in the Malvern Hills continues to give us a very good deal for high quality board and lodging at a low price, amidst spectacular scenery, but a four-day residential meeting is unavoidably costly. We know this cost can be a barrier discouraging some from attending Conference.

The good news is that generous donations from diocesan bishops and legacies from Guild members mean we have ample bursary funds available with which to offer substantial discounts from the conference fee for any (non-overseas) member who would otherwise have difficulty attending. And we would like many more members to take advantage of this. These bursaries are not solely for those in exceptionally dire straits – anyone living on a typical verger's salary and paying their own conference fee would be eligible for a bursary if requested!

We have agreed that any delegate booking to attend Conference for the first time next year will automatically be considered for a £100 bursary (larger discounts can be available in case of need) - perhaps this might be the nudge you need to encourage you to attend? This arrangement should also assist those obliged to attend the Conference as part of the requirements of the Guild's Diploma. But noone who has attended our Conference before should feel disadvantaged: all members can contact the National Chaplain, in confidence, to apply for a bursary, either before or after submitting their Conference booking form.

Meet the National Membership Officer

y life in the Church started when I was a little 7 year old. A man came to my primary School and asked a group of us to sing a well-known nursery rhyme. He was actually the Director of Music at Cirencester Parish Church and I was then invited to become a chorister there in the heart of the Cotswolds for where I was just over 13 years. I was also studying Performing arts at Cirencester College.

It was during my time at Cirencester I thought 'What am I going to do later in life?' A Bus driver? Perform on Stage? A vicar?

A friend introduced me to the Vergers at Gloucester Cathedral, and I had a very happy time working behind the scenes there. It was a job where often people would turn up to a service, see it set up and then later come back to the Cathedral and it had magically disappeared! There was something quite mysterious about the job which I enjoyed. Occasionally heard but not seen was the key! Also, something quite special knowing you are looking after an ancient building for others to enjoy for years to come.

My first employment as Verger was in 2009 at Hereford Cathedral and spent 8 years furthering my career. It was during a day out on a day off in Bristol where I met John Kirby-Shearer during his time at St Mary, Redcliffe who encouraged me to join '*The Church of England Guild of Vergers*' and was then admitted by Canon Maureen in the Cathedral and supported by the Gloucester, Hereford & Worcester branch.

It was at Hereford I met my wife, Louise who volunteered at the Cathedral.

We moved to Lancing, West Sussex in August 2017 to work in the magnificent

19th century mock- gothic College Chapel. The largest School Chapel in the world! The welcome we were given by the Chaplain at the time, The Rev'd Richard Harrison, Jeremy Tomlinson (Chapel Steward) & the Head Master, we knew that we would be very settled in the College community. Louise got employed by the College as Admissions database Officer a few months later. My first day was the following day after the move and was an exciting start to what life would be life on the Sussex coast after leaving the countryside of Herefordshire. I had a big responsibility to look after a well-known Sussex landmark and the beating heart of the School.

My day is varied, and no day is the same. My day would start by assisting Fr Justin at the altar. I could then be leading a tour for a coach party, helping pupils rehearse their readings for the Whole School Eucharist or on the Chapel roof, some 150ft up, clearing the gutters and admiring the incredible views (if it isn't too blowy!). I am also very lucky and grateful to have Sue James, the term time Chapel Cleaner who always goes beyond the call of duty to assist me and the work of the Chapel and remains dedicated. Many visitors have remarked how clean the Chapel is. I often name her as an assistant Verger!

2021 was a special year for me as I (finally!) finished my Guild of Vergers diploma after several years working on it! I was and also remain very grateful for the patience of the Executive committee. I collected this at the Guild conference in Great Malvern and I wear my hood with pride during Evensongs on a Friday in term time. It was then at the 2022 conference that I was nominated and elected to the role of 'National Membership Officer' which looks after the Headquarter membership to which I am honoured to be voted in for alongside being Branch Secretary to the Chichester, Guildford & Portsmouth branch.

Being a verger is very much a vocation. The varied tasks from day to day, some of which are pastoral, take time



and dedication which fills you with an enormous sense of achievement and pride. I have thoroughly enjoyed my time so far at Lancing College and as a Verger and know that I can continue to grow as a person and as a vocation as the years go on.

Finally, words from my two line managers.

We have been very fortunate to have enjoyed the devoted service of a succession of experienced holders of the post of verger over the years, their profile has been younger and their responsibilities diversified. In the six years he has been with us, Andrew has expanded the role and enhanced his own professional expertise and influence. In 2017, for the first time, the job incorporated the role of 'caretaker' which has previously been taken for granted. Andrew assists with maintaining the fabric of the building as well as the cleaning, refurbishing and improving it for daily use. He supports the Choir and musicians, and the Friends of Lancing Chapel, ensuring a safe welcome for visitors, pupils and staff. In this he is helped by an enthusiastic team of volunteer guides and also Chapel Cleaner, Sue James. His main task, however, is to assist the Chaplain in the celebration of the liturgy and to make sure that the Chapel is a place of continuing prayer and worship.

Andrew is very much a 'Verger plus', going out of his way to support the life of the Chapel in worship through enabling the smooth running of services and working closely with the sacristan team, in welcoming visitors and over seeing the team of volunteer guides and in his care for the fabric of the building. New Virgers in Kingston

The historic town-centre parish church of All Saints, Kingston upon Thames has recently reinstated the role of robed Virger after a gap of seventy-five years.

All Saints is the ancient parish church of Kingston, built on the site of a Saxon minster where the coronations of seven Saxon kings took place, including those of King Edward the Elder (900AD) and King Athelstan (925AD). Today it is the civic church of the Royal Borough and a member of the Major Churches Network.

There had not been a Verger at All Saints since the retirement of the last postholder in 1948, and now there are two, both volunteers and both members of the Guild. There are records of a Verger being part of the church establishment (presumably remunerated) in the 19th century, and the names of the three Vergers from 1899 until 1948 are recorded. A father and son succession held the post from 1902: William Harling until his death in 1933 and then his son until his retirement through ill-health in 1948.

As the church already had a longstanding team of volunteer 'vergers' who help to keep the church open seven days a week throughout the year, the ancient title 'Virger' was adopted for the new roles. The Head Virger and the Under Virger now lead the choir and clergy into and out of the main weekly services (Sunday morning at 9.30am and Choral Evensong at 6.00pm and Wednesday afternoons at 5.30pm), and also at the many Civic and Kingston Episcopal Area services that take place at All Saints. The Under-Virger carries the historic silver-topped Beadle's Staff, which dates back to 1829, and as the photo of William Harling shows (above) was also carried by the Verger in times past.

rank Woodward was the Verger at St Leonards Church. Balderstone nr Blackburn Lancashire, for over 40 years. Sadly Frank was diagnosed with Cancer at the start of the Covid Pandemic, during which the Church was closed for services. He was receiving care in a home in Blackburn prior to his death on the 5 December 2022.



Frank joined the Blackburn Branch of the Guild in 1984 and was admitted to the Guild in Blackburn Cathedral. He was one of the longest serving members of the Blackburn Branch, supported by his wife Anne.

Frank received his 30 years certificate in 2014 at the Lancaster Priory Festival. Along with Anne, he attended many of the Guild Festivals and events throughout various Cathedrals and Parish Churches.

At his Church in the small village of Balderstone, Frank would often be seen caring for the grounds, as well as the "liturgical" jobs of the Verger. He was noted for his work load and commitment and especially during interregnums, with weddings, funerals and baptism arrangements on his agenda, again supported by Anne who attended to the flowers, linen, cleaning among other things. Sadly due to illness and with the Covid pandemic Frank and Anne were unable to attend any Branch meetings, Frank was not IT trained so was unable to join virtually.

His funeral was held at his "Spiritual Home" of St Leonards on the 20 December, and I, along with my colleague Pam Derbyshire were privileged to attend on behalf of the Three Branches. It was an honour to be able to visit Frank in the last days of his eventful life, Rest in Peace loyal Servant of Christ and Rise in Glory.

Ernest Nicholas Kröhn

rnest, known my many as Ernie, was born and grew up in Southampton, but due to his family situation went to live with his aunt in Bournemouth. He became a member of St John the Evangelist Church in Boscombe. In its heyday, it had a robed choir of 25 under the direction of Norman Wilson and Ernie was a longstanding stalwart of the choir for many years.

Ernie's day job was that of a window dresser for Foster Brothers. With his interest in choral music, Ernie could be found in many of the stores, setting up displays, with his radio on listening to Choral Evensong on Radio 3 on a Wednesday afternoon.

I was encouraged by school friends to join St John's whilst at secondary school as it had a thriving choir and a strong and very active youth club. As many of you that remembered Ernie, he was a very warm and welcoming person who always took an interest in everyone he met. His passion for church music shone through during practise and services. The older members of the youth club would continue their fellowship at Ernie's on a Sunday night, which encouraged the friendships to grow stronger. One member of the congregation was David Dorey who was a good friend of Ernie's and the two of them would talk 'church' most of the time. Both became members of the Guild and David moved on from Bournemouth to become Head Verger at Coventry Cathedral and latterly at Westminster Abbey. Ernie would be a frequent visitor to both cathedrals. I left St John's and moved to St Peter's Bournemouth but kept in touch with Ernie over the years and when I left Bournemouth and moved to London. When I visited my family in Bournemouth, I made a point of always touching base with him. Latterly, when I became a verger and joined the Guild, our friendship became stronger, and we would meet up at our annual conferences. It was always

a joy to see his smiling face and we would spend many an hour reminiscing about past members of the church. Ernie enjoyed coming to conference and was always up for a laugh. I recall a visit we made to Hendon Police College, and he was very quick to jump into the back of the police van and pretend to be an angry hooligan. I think this picture went viral around the Guild.

Although St John's did not use a verger for ceremonial roles, he was always the person who carried out the role of a verger behind the scenes, quietly and efficiently. Being part of the Guild enabled Ernie to wear his gown and white bow tie for services as seen at the Festival at St Paul's Cathedral for our 75th Anniversary.

Ernie was for many years a stalwart member of the Bournemouth and Channel Isles Branch and Area Leader for that Branch and (when it was in existence) the Winchester Branch and served many years on the Central Council of the Guild. The Guild honoured him with National Life Membership for all his work.

When I learnt that Ernie passed away on Pentecost Sunday 28th May 2023. I sent a message to a school friend who said "he was a great influence on me when I was young; I always enjoyed his sunny personality in the St John's choir and his sense of dignity in worship. We used to have some fun times at his



place after choir practice. For some reason, I always remember watching 'The Goodies' round his house. I never felt anything but kindness and warmth for him." His vicar Revd. Roy Khakhria said he was held in high esteem at the church and that he was a Verger's verger. I could not have agreed with either of those two comments more. It was a privilege for me to lead Ernie's coffin in and out of the church for the last time at his funeral on 5th July, both as a friend and as National Chairman of the Guild that he loved. Many of the old youth club came from all over the country to pay their respects after over 50 years of knowing him. One couple celebrated their 48th wedding anniversary by attending his funeral on the very day. Vergers also gathered from near and far to provide a guard of honour, something that I am sure would have humbled a good and faithful servant. May he rest in loving peace in the presence of his Lord.
