The Ven Dr David Jenkins, National Chaplain writes...

Dear Sisters and Brothers

Some of you may know that before coming to Suffolk I was a residentiary canon at Carlisle cathedral. Several years ago, I came into the cathedral at 7.30am on the Monday after the Sunday celebration of the Ascension to say the morning office as we did every weekday. As I sat down in my stall, I noticed a picture sitting on my seat. I instantly recognised the distinctive artistic style to be that of my eight-year-old daughter Niamh. It was a picture of a redheaded Virgin Mary looking up at a pair of feet disappearing into the clouds with a speech bubble coming out of the clouds enclosing the word 'Bye'. This drawing was undoubtedly artistically primitive, perhaps even theologically suspect, but it was also instantly recognisable as a visual depiction of the Ascension. Indeed, if one takes the biblical text as a guide then the sight of a pair of feet disappearing into the clouds is possibly not too far off the mark.

My daughter's attempt at drawing what the Ascension of Christ might have looked like to those who were present has a long and honourable history. Down the Ages artists have made many attempts, with varying degrees of success it has to be said, to depict in visual image what the act of Ascension might have looked like to those who were witnesses and to be honest my daughter's take was as good a guess as anyone else's.

I begin my letter for this edition of the magazine with this story because I am writing in that period between Ascension Day and the Feast of Pentecost as we await the coming of the Holy Spirit amongst us. I marked this Ascension Day with a gravity defying climb to the top of Lavenham church for an early morning act of worship and a view of the stunning English countryside that could not be bettered. It was truly divine.

Of course, while the Ascension marks the end of Jesus's ministry it is not an end but a beginning. The Great Commissioning at the end of Matthew's gospel; the exhortation at the end of both Mark and Luke's gospel to go out into the world and preach Christ crucified; the promise at the end of Luke's gospel that Jesus was soon to send the Holy Spirit to them; and the commissioning of Peter at the end of John's gospel; all these things speak of what is to come. The reader is left in no doubt that whatever else the Ascension might be it is also a beginning and a catalyst.

We, of course, are part of that 'what next?' Whatever the truth about the actuality and detail of the Ascension event the important message for every believer is that even though Jesus is now absent *physically* from the earth, he is still *spiritually* present with his church, the Body of Christ on earth. We all lead very busy lives, and the last few months will have been no exception but in the midst of the busyness we recall that what we do we do in the name of our Lord. No matter how mundane a task, or how lowly a calling, we are all part of the ongoing narrative of Gods' redeeming love for his world and we all play a vital part in that unfolding drama.

I am looking forward immensely to seeing as many of you as possible at this year's conference in West Malvern. This is always a wonderful occasion for study, retreat, fellowship and just plain good old-fashioned fun so do please try and join us. See you there!

Executive Committee Round-Up



he Executive Committee met in April at the Royal Foundation of St Katherine, in Limehouse, London. During this meeting we received an update of the Way Ahead Group – which is also in this magazine.

The two other main areas that were discussed was the following:

National Chairman Terms of Office - A paper was written by our legal advisor detailing that the current Statutes were outdated for the needs of the Guild, the National Chairman was the only role within the Guild that set a number of terms limit. The statutes stated that a person may serve a three year Term of Office as National Chairman, and then stand for a second three year term, but at this point must step down for at least one period of three years before standing again – should they wish – it was felt that, considering how every other term of office for a position allowed a person to stand for as long as they wished, that the National Chairman should fall into this routine. It should be noted that this does not and should not mean that they should stand unopposed and should a person wish to stand for a role they must not feel that just because a person is willing to stand that they should not stand against.

This paper was presented to the Executive Committee for consideration, and following a discussion an anonymous vote was taken – overseen by the National Chaplain who is not able to vote – the result of this was unanimous support of the paper and the Statutes were agreed to be adjusted with immediate effect. The paragraph within section 1.1 of the Statutes was adjusted to:

On completion of their three-year term they may choose to stand for election for one further consecutive term of three years. There is no limit to the number of consecutive terms a person may serve as National Chairman

This is available to be viewed on the Guild's website under 'Downloadable Publications' where the Statues have been updated.

This now means that if our current National Chairman, John Kirby-Shearer, wished to stand again he would be eligible to do so.

GDPR advice – One of the other areas of discussion held was the use of work emails for guild correspondence. If was advised that should we receive any information that would be considered a protected Characteristics of GDPR, the

seven main Protected Characteristics are:

- age.
- · disability.
- gender reassignment.
- marriage or civil partnership (in employment only)
- pregnancy and maternity.
- race.
- · religion or belief.
- sex.

If we receive any of this information from the Guild or any other organisation into our work email accounts we may be opening ourselves up to a potential breach. The reason for this is that our employers own the work email account and have the right to access our email and therefore have access to this data that is not work related.

It is recommended that we use personal email accounts to receive this information and if we are Officers of the Guild – be this National or Branch – we do not use work accounts.

Should you be currently doing so please update the General Secretary with a new email address.



Vocations

ermon Preached on Vocations Sunday at St John's College Chapel, by the Dean of Chapel, Revd Dr Victoria Johnson

St Thérèse of Liseux was someone who thought long about what her vocation might be. She was a young nun, born in 1873, and reflected on how and why she was being called. She prayed to God with these words: *I seem to have so many* vocations! She felt called to be a soldier, a priest, an apostle, a doctor, a martyr, a missionary. How did she discern her call, her vocation? In the end Thérèse remembered that she was part of the body of Christ. This wasn't just about her. Her identity and her calling was found in him. She came to the conclusion, that her vocation wasn't a job, or a role, it wasn't even about being a nun. Her vocation was to inhabit, to follow, to live out the very nature of who God is: pure, unbounded love. Without this love, she said, there would be no church, and this love is the motivating force which enables members of the church to act. Love, in fact, is the vocation which includes all others; it's a universe of its own, comprising all time and space, said this young woman who gave her life to Christ. Perhaps Thérèse's words can encourage each one of us to spend some time thinking, not necessarily about

what course we complete, or what job we do- not about how much we earn or the letters after our name, but about God's will in our life, and in the life of our communities. God's call in our lives does not promise to be easy or comfortable, or even free from pain and sorrow. But it does promise to be the means by which we find our fulfillment, where we live out our resurrection faith and where we become people made in the image of love.

Revd Canon Tim Goode. was brought up in Worcestershire. His father was a Vicar and Tim was a chorister at St Michael's Tenbury before gaining a music scholarship to Ellesmere College. Tim studied Music Composition and



Performance at Huddersfield Polytechnic and trained as a secondary school teacher at the Roehampton Institute. He was a music teacher at St Philomena's School in Carshalton from 1991-1995, before being appointed Director of Music of Homefield School in Sutton from 1995-2007. He trained for ministry at Ripon College Cuddesdon and served his title at Croydon Minster, in the Diocese of Southwark and was ordained priest in 2010.

Tim was Team Vicar of St Luke's Whyteleafe and St Peter and St Paul, Chaldon from September 2012 to May 2018, part of the Caterham Team Ministry. From 2013 to 2021 he was also the Southwark Diocesan Disability Advisor. He was appointed Rector of St Margaret's Lee in the Southwark Diocese in May 2018.

Tim is a member of the National Disability Task Group, which advises the Archbishops of Canterbury and York on disability issues. A member of the General Synod between 2015 – 2023, Tim led the first debate on disability at the General Synod in July 2022. He was a member of the Archbishops' Council between 2020 – 2023. Tim was made an Honorary Canon of Southwark Cathedral in September 2020 and has been a trustee of the Churches Conservation Trust since November 2020. Since September 2023 Tim has been the residentiary Canon for Congregational Discipleship and Nurture at York Minster.

Tim has been married to Bernie since 1995. Tim is disabled and writes and lectures on the Theology of Disability. His particular academic interest is exploring how a Christian anthropology, founded upon the resurrected body of Jesus Christ, challenges our cultural perceptions of perfection.

Tuesday 6 — Session III

Brother Stuart Burns OSB

- Muchnell Abbey

Stuart was ordained in Ripon Cathedral in 1969 and for the next 20 years ministered in Ripon Diocese in both urban and rural parishes, as a chaplain to Leeds University and Polytechnic and as chaplain to a



large motorcycle club. In 1989 he joined the community of Benedictine nuns and monks at Burford in Oxfordshire, and in 1996 was elected to succeed the retiring Mother Superior. As abbot he oversaw the re-location of the community to Worcestershire, having bought the then derelict Mucknell Farm and had it transformed into a "sustainable" 21st Century monastery. After 21 years 'at the helm' he returned to the ranks of his sisters and brothers having handed on the abbacy to Br Thomas.

Prior to ordination, Wendy was a Youth and Community worker, working in faith-based and secular settings,

She spent three years in Guildford Diocese as Priest-In-Charge of a rural multiparish benefice, and for the past eight years has been Rector of All Saints with Holy Trinity, Loughborough in the Diocese of Leicester where she has fostered an inclusive approach to both the pastoral and liturgical life of the church. She has also served as Area Dean, Chair of House of Clergy and most recently as a General Synod representative.

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The Way Ahead Group

n April, a small group gathered in London to discuss the future of the Guild of Vergers. The areas covered were the management of the Guild and their branches, magazine and communication, the officers of the Guild, links with other organisations. We opened with a general discussion session when everyone around the table expressed their viewpoints on how the Guild did or didn't work.

The group comprised of a Bishop, a new member of the Guild, Standing Committee and a few of selected members. After the first session, it became very evident that the Guild of Vergers were not the only organisation that were in a similar situation.

Recently we have sadly been in the situation where branches have closed due to the ageing population and reticence of members willing to step up to undertake branch officer roles, coupled with dwindling numbers.

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The first session dealt with the management of the Guild. We currently have branches around the country, with at least three officers managing each branch. The aim of the branches is to give local support and fellowship for our members. With the difficulties now facing branches in finding volunteers to take on roles within their branch, it is now a suggestion that branches should remain in situ, but the administration be centralised. This will do away with the formality of AGM's, formal meetings and all financial aspects of running a branch. The suggestion is that members will pay directly to headquarters and all funds will be submitted to the Central Fund. Each branch will have a coordinator who will be the link between headquarters and members. Any visits, tours or meals will be funded by those who attend in their areas and information will be sent directly to members from the centre of the Guild. It was suggested that spiritual support would still be required by local chaplains. As a result of these changes, it could assist smaller groups to be reformed rather than the very large branches that have now created problems of travel around the branch.

To assist with the new branch set up, the role of the Regional Representatives and their deputies was the next item for discussion. It was generally felt that the current system was clearly not working. Their ongoing role was examined, and it was felt that there is a need for a representative to be a link with several branches in their area and be able to give support when needed and be a voice on the senior management committee. The complex system of selection needs to be simplified.

The make-up of the senior management team was also discussed. All the posts currently held by members who serve on the Executive Committee and appointed posts were looked at by the working group. It was generally felt that tightening the roles and look at updating job descriptions and strengthening job roles with the view to becoming a more professional organisation.

The Virger Magazine was discussed the next session. It was generally felt that the overall tone and quality of the magazine has improved over recent years. The wider range of articles was felt to be a good thing. The usual points were covered about size of the magazine, paper quality and number of editions were also discussed. The central posting out of the magazine four times a year was now embedded into our way of life and should remain. It is important that all members should inform headquarters on any changes in personal information so that records are up to date.



Greater use of electronic media was needed with use of the website and current social media sites such as Instagram should be embraced, with the correct checks and balances. Training is a large part of what the Guild is all about. We currently have the Training Course, which has a Foundation Unit and three other units which culminates in being awarded an in-house Diploma. It was felt that the contents is in constant need of updating to meet the changing requirements of todays church. This will equip vergers to embrace the changes that are required in the workplace and become a creditable entity to the Church as a whole. The annual conference and retreat serves a huge purpose, but is in grave danger of becoming a monster. It was agreed that the programme should be looked at to enable a stronger teaching element with updated training issues being covered, but mindful that it is also a time for retreat as well as learning. It is a time for fellowship along with the festivals that are currently organised. Costs, organising events around the country were outlined and work on reshaping our times together will need to be looked at.

The issue of recruitment of new members is a recurring subject, but it was felt that over the past few years, the membership of the Guild has attracted younger and new members and this is not so much of an issue to worry about at the moment.

There was a suggestion that links should be explored and strengthened between the Deans' Vergers and the Vergers Guild of the Episcopal Church. Some work has already started with the VGEC with the Memorandum of Understanding which formalises our links between the two Guilds.

The initial discussions that were undertaken by WAG gave the current Executive Group a great deal to think about and it now the hard work begins in teasing out solutions to the suggestions that were made. It is important to note at this point, that there will have to be changes and some hard decisions will have to be made to enable the Guild to move forward and survive into the future. The implantation will have to traverse through the usual channels over the coming months. It is important that all our members are part of this process to enable the Guild to thrive so please remember the Executive Group in your prayers as we move forward and embrace the changes that are needed.
