The Ven Dr David Jenkins, National Chaplain writes...

Dear Sisters and Brothers

I am writing this in the Octave of Easter. As a Bishop's staff we have been reflecting on a wonderful Holy Week and Easter across the diocese here. Our churches were well-attended, and the weather was great! There is much to give thanks for. I preached on Easter Sunday in a small Suffolk country church to over 80 people of all ages. I am happy to say the sermon appears to have been well-received!

That said the first Christian sermon ever preached was not well received. Indeed, it was not even believed. As per divine instruction, the women told what they had seen (and had not seen) at the tomb and they shared the message of the angels, "He is risen! Remember what he told you?" But the male congregation who heard this message most certainly did not remember. They thought the women were making it all up, were full of nonsense, were telling idle tales, were delirious. So that first Easter morning, no one greeted the news that God had raised Jesus from the grave and defeated death and evil, with shouts of "Hallelujah, Praise God, Christ is Risen, Shout Hosanna." Absolutely no one, upon hearing the news that death itself could not hold the Lord of Glory captive, said, "I knew it, this is just like he told us it would be!" The women were perplexed and terrified and the men thought the women were nuts.

Easter is perplexing, and believing in the resurrection is challenging, isn't it? We have never seen or experienced anything like it. We have always been told that there are two things you can be sure of in life: death and taxes. We know taxes and we know death – it is all around us. We have



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watched plants, animals and people die. But if the dead don't stay dead, what can you count on? So, who can blame the disciples? There were good reasons for the women to be cautious, perplexed, and even frightened. There were good reasons for the men to be unbelieving. Resurrection breaks all the rules, and while most of us will admit that the rules aren't perfect at least we know what they are. They are predictable and scientific, a known quantity, and in that sense, comforting.

Resurrection upsets all of that. Resurrection throws us off the balance, rocks the boat, upsets the apple cart, and generally turns our neat and orderly lives totally upside down. So, if you don't find resurrection at least a little hard to believe, you probably aren't taking it very seriously! Resurrection faith came slowly to most of the disciples. But when it came, it changed everything.

And of course we do remember. The church remembers every time a priest presides at the eucharist (often accompanied by their trusty verger!). The church remembers every year through its Easter mysteries. Each of us testifies to that moment of existential revelation by our lives of faith and service. Every lesson, every sermon, every hymn, every prayer begins by remembering, remembering what God has done through Christ lesus.

Many of you (all of you?) will have been part of this remembering this Easter. You will have born the heat of the day...and the evening and the night! You will have given of your time, energy, and love. You will have verged, served, cleaned, polished and scrubbed. You will have moved furniture, then moved it again, and then put it back where it came from in the first place. You will have borne the brunt of others' anxiety and stress. You will have supported and comforted your clergy. You will have stood at the foot of the cross. You may even have wept.

For all this I thank you in the name of the church and may the joy of the resurrected Jesus touch each and every one of you. Hopefully I will see many of you at the conference in West Malvern in August. Until then every blessing.

The Executive Committee met in March at the Southwark Diocesan Offices, London





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uring this meeting we reviewed our Safeguarding Policy, Expenses Policy and out Data Protection Policy, all of these were approved and are now available on the Guild Website.

We reported that we have now introduced, as was approved at the last Executive Meeting, that each member of the Guild now receives as part of their Membership Fees the Guild Magazine, we have made concessions where there are more than one member per household. We are passionate about the production of the Virger Magazine and believe that this should be our mouth piece of the Guild – but to do this we need your input, we need articles about what you get up to as a Verger, some ideas of what your do as a Branch or Group, how you deal with those 'accidents' that always crop up in our ministry. As we have said before we want the Magazine to be forward facing not always retrospective. The Magazine is sent out to all members, all Diocesen Bishops and all Church of England Training Houses.

Changes to Branch make ups were discussed at the meeting where we noted that so far about three Branches have changed to become a Group.

A question was raised at one of the Way Ahead Group Meetings as to the use of the Church of England's Logo and if we were able to use it. We were pleased to report that the Digital Team of the CofE have confirmed that we can use it in line with their published usage (https://www.churchofengland.org/media/logo-and-visual-identity)

We are beginning to look at the Guild Archives, as a lot of material has been kept from the start of the Guild, some of it useful and informative, some not so. We are looking at what we should keep and how we do this.

For Welfare Officer Dee Caulton-Ball



I have been an active member of the Guild since joining in 1998 when a volunteer verger in Birmingham Cathedral. I have been privileged to have served the Guild in a number of roles including Branch Chair, and for 8 years Area Leader, for Birmingham Lichfield and Coventry and later Branch Chair of Hereford, Gloucester

and Worcester. I also served for 6 years as the National Liaison Officer during which I was able to establish the Guild as a regular exhibitor at General Synod meetings in both London and York.

My interest has always been primarily in pastoral care. Before becoming a verger I trained as a nurse working in hospitals, domiciliary care and a dental practice. Later on I moved from Birmingham to become a paid verger in Oxford where I experienced at first hand the importance of the role of the Guild Welfare Officer. As the victim of a continued bullying campaign, I was only sustained by the advice and support of the then Welfare Officer, Michael Golby. From Oxford I moved to life as a religious, becoming a novice in the Convent of the Holy Name and serving as a regular member of the pastoral team in Derby Cathedral nearby. For family reasons I had to leave the Convent and was fortunate to become a full-time verger in a city centre church in the Jewellery Quarter of Birmingham where part of the role was providing pastoral care to the surrounding industrial area.

I then undertook full time study for a theology diploma, combining it with a voluntary role as Beadle in the local parish church and continuing as a Visitors Chaplain at Birmingham Cathedral. As part of the course I had a placement in the

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chaplaincy of a hospice which I found immensely rewarding and reinforced my commitment to pastoral care. I am also a practising Spiritual Director and so very aware of the need for absolute discretion. In my current, very rural, parish where, as churchwarden, I do all the duties the verger would do if we had one, I founded a carers' group which met regularly to provide pastoral care to the carers themselves who are often forgotten. I also serve as a Day Chaplain at Hereford Cathedral (one day a month) looking after both staff and visitors.

On a more personal note I am married (to Andrew Page a former National Treasurer of the Guild) and we live in the depths of rural Herefordshire. I have a passion for ecclesiastical embroidery, reading and music.

I know from my own experience that the Welfare Officer can be a very present help in time of trouble and, if elected, I would aim to be that for every member of the Guild who needed help or just a sympathetic ear.

Having been a verger for over a decade (just under two years at St. Edmundsbury Cathedral, and 11 years at Sheffield Cathedral), and a Guild member for a similar amount of time (Ipswich Branch, as was, and York Branch) I have experienced what would cause a fellow professional to seek pastoral care, prayer, support and welfare.

When I am not working I like to travel around the country and, if I visit another cathedral, or a church where there is one, I make a point of engaging with the vergers (as long as they aren't too busy) and experiencing what it is like for them, not just to see how their workplace compares to where I work, but also to help me to understand the pressures they face, and any support and advice they might need. I also speak to others over Messenger if they wish to offload.

Praying for others is another important factor in my life, and it's something I try and do daily, including praying for those on the Guild's Intercession list, both at a Branch, and National level (as listed in the magazine). The worship of the Church is, for me, the most important aspect of my role as a verger (I was given the unique position of Liturgical Verger back in June 2021) and I am part of the worshipping community not only at Sheffield Cathedral, where I work, but in a number of other churches in the diocese and beyond, so I am used to praying for people who I do not know, as well as those I do.

All in all I feel that these aspects that I have mentioned can be best summed up in the following objectives of the Guild:

- Promoting the spiritual nature of the Vergers' Vocation through Christian fellowship and spiritual guidance for all its members.
- Providing support and encouragement to the membership in all aspects of their duties whatever they may be and wherever performed.
- Advising, upon request, and making recommendations as to terms of employment and welfare of any Member.
- Recording the gamut of work undertaken by Vergers; and taking account of each Member's training, experience and qualifications.

THE MINISTRY OF MUSIC

Monday 4 – Thursday 7 August

Monday 4 — Session I

Sir Dr John Rutter – Composer, musician

John Rutter was born in London and studied music at Clare College, Cambridge. He first came to notice as a composer during his student years; much of his early work consisted of church music and other choral pieces



including Christmas carols. From 1975-79 he was Director of Music at his alma mater, Clare College, and directed the college chapel choir in various recordings and broadcasts. Since 1979 he has divided his time between composition and conducting. Today his compositions, including such concert-length works as Requiem, Magnificat, Mass of the Children, The Gift of Life, and Visions are performed around the world. His music has featured in a number of British royal occasions, including the two most recent royal weddings. He edits the Oxford Choral Classics series, and, with Sir David Willcocks, co-edited four volumes of Carols for Choirs. In 1983 he formed his own choir the Cambridge Singers, with whom he has made numerous recordings, and he appears regularly in several countries as guest conductor and choral ambassador. He holds a Lambeth Doctorate in Music, and in 2007 was awarded a CBE for services to music. In September 2023, he received the Ivors Academy Fellowship, joining a prestigious list of 24 Fellows including John Adams, Pierre Boulez CBE, Kate Bush CBE and Sir Elton John.

In 1988 he became a fellow of the Guild of Church Musicians. In 1996 the Archbishop of Canterbury conferred a Lambeth Doctorate of Music upon him in recognition of his contribution to church music. In 2008 he also became an honorary Bencher of the Middle Temple while playing a significant role in the 2008 Temple Festival. John Rutter was made a Commander of the Order of the British Empire (CBE) in the 2007 New Year Honours and knighted in the 2024 Birthday Honours, both for services to music.

He continues to enjoy putting good news stories and top quality inspirational music on TV and it's fabulous to work with a great team and great talent on screen including Katherine Jenkins, Aled Jones, Sean Fletcher and The Rev'd Kate Bottley. As a leader with infectious enthusiasm and as a creative programme-maker, he is proud of the impact he has made on all the teams he has worked in.

Tuesday 5 — Session III

The Rev'd Canon Philip Banks – Precentor, St Paul's Cathedral

Philip is Chair of the National Precentors' Network and joins St Paul's from St Edmundsbury Cathedral in Suffolk where he has been Residentiary Canon and Precentor for over 12 years.



During his time at the Cathedral, he has led and overseen the establishment of girl choristers, a graduate and post-graduate organ scholar programme and the Cathedral's 'Singing in Schools' initiative. Coupled with this, he has helped arrange a weekly allages service, which brings in young children all the way through to octogenarians.



Prior to this role, Philip served as Bishop's Chaplain and Press Officer in Essex. He has been ordained for 30 years, serving in a variety of parochial roles and as Area Dean. Before ordination Philip had a career as a Chartered Surveyor.

The Revd Canon Philip Banks commented: 'Cathedrals are extraordinary places of encounter, speaking of God's transcendent presence in stone, wood and glass. They are also communities of living stones, journeying together to the Kingdom. It is my privilege to be appointed to serve as a Residentiary Canon at St Paul's, unique amongst Cathedrals, and to have a hand in shaping the worship of the Cathedral as it seeks to serve the Diocese, city and nation, and its role as an international icon of Christ's inclusive heart of love.

'Having established girl choristers in St Edmundsbury Cathedral, I am delighted that on Sunday St Paul's welcomed girls' voices into their Cathedral Choir for the first time. I look forward to seeing them flourish and supporting further work like this at the Cathedral.'

Wednesday 6 — Session IV

Stuart Freed - Chairman, Elgar Society

Stuart Freed is a retired Technology teacher, who spent some thirty years in the classroom. He has been a member of the Elgar Society for some 35 years during which time he has served a Chairman of the Southern Branch, Society Council member, Vice-Chairman and, since 2021, Chairman of the Society.



He is an experienced speaker on the life and music of Edward Elgar, giving talks on various facets of his life and music to a variety of audiences both within the Society and to outside groups such as PROBUS, the WI and other bodies. He also speaks locally on Jazz.

Stuart lives in Worcester with his wife Jan and a grumpy cat.

Wednesday 6 — Session V

Andrew Kirk – Organist

Andrew is a freelance organist, accompanist, choral director and composer working mainly in the Bristol and North Somerset area. He is an occasional accompanist for various choral societies, community and church choirs. He is Director of Henbury



Singers, a chamber choir of 20 singers. For five months in 2024, he held the position as Interim Director of Music at Cirencester Parish Church. In Autumn 2024 Andrew was appointed Director of Good Afternoon Choirs in North Somerset and Chepstow.

From 2003-2023, he held the position of Director of Music and Organist at St Mary Redcliffe Church, Bristol, where he had responsibility for directing several choirs at the church and regularly gave concerts on the famous 1912 Harrison and Harrison organ. In the past year, his organ concerts have included St David's Cathedral, St Chad's Cathedral, Tewkesbury Abbey, Christchurch Priory, Albert Hall Nottingham and Brangwyn Hall Swansea.

From 1994-2003 he was Director of Music at St John's Church, Ranmoor, Sheffield. He also taught class music at three secondary schools, including Lady Manners School, Bakewell. He has been an external consultant for the appointment of Directors of Music in some of the larger churches in the UK.

Born and educated in Leicester, he won an Organ Scholarship to Pembroke College, Oxford where he studied organ with David Sanger. He spent two years in Western Australia as Assistant Organist at St George's Anglican Cathedral in Perth. He holds the FRCO Diploma, gaining the Turpin and Durrant prizes for organ playing.

Welcome to our Summer Edition!

s I finish editing this issue, just before it is sent off for design, our brothers in Christ in the Roman Catholic Church are preparing for a period, both solemn and momentous: the Conclave—the election of a new Bishop of Rome, Vicar of Christ, and, until the 19th century, the Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire.

Meanwhile, within the Church of England, we, too, are discerning the appointment of our next spiritual leader—the Archbishop of Canterbury. This selection, undertaken through prayer, consultation, and thoughtful listening to the Church's communicants, may lead—perhaps for the first time—to a woman being appointed to the role. Yet, as in any such appointment, there will be differing opinions: some will see the choice as inspired, others may not.


Why speak of leadership selection at all? Well, I was once a pupil at a Roman Catholic school. When Pope John Paul II died, I visited my old friend Father Brendon, a wise priest nearing retirement. We sat together over coffee in the local Roman Catholic church, reflecting on the challenges the next pope might face and the qualities we hoped to see in his successor.

As we considered the questions stirring the Vatican then—and still relevant now—I realised how significant and spiritually weighty such moments are. The Church of England had recently gone through a similar process. The selection of a pope is unlike any other; although modern conclaves are shorter than the longest in history (which lasted an astonishing 1005 days), they remain closed, deeply prayerful affairs—free from external influence or coercion.

That evening, we knelt together at the communion rail of St Mary's Roman Catholic Church and prayed—prayed for the Spirit of Christ to guide a world mourning a monumental figure, a pope who had stood firmly against communism. On the first day of the conclave in 2005, I returned, and again we knelt and prayed. Father Brendon expressed his hope that the cardinals would choose someone strong, just, and faithful—not only to serve the Roman Catholic Church but to act as a moral beacon for all of Christianity and indeed, all faiths. In Pope Benedict XVI, I believe, that prayer was answered.

This year, as both the Church of England and the Roman Catholic Church seek new leaders, we must pray again—fervently—for strength, wisdom, and courage in those who are chosen. Leaders who will bind up the wounds of the brokenhearted, speak truth in a divided world, and carry forward the message of Christ with unwavering faith.
